




Fleetwood Park Students Place 1st in the 2023 CIC Regional Crystal Growing Competition!!

Greetings participants and teachers,

We would like to thank you for your participation in the 2023 crystal growing competition. The alumina crystals were evaluated on a number of criteria (eg weight, lack of occulsions, sharp edges, etc..., photo on the next page). The judging was done at Dr. Alannah Hallas (UBC, see https://mw.matterport.com/show/?m=qZAdmNHmPrD for a virtual tour of the lab).

The top four crystals were mailed to the Chemical Institute of Canada / Institut de chimie du Canada National Crystal Growing Competition. The judging at that competition is expected to be done soon and we hope to hear back from the national judging committee soon. As requested, we have the results for the Lower Mainland submissions. *We hope we have all your names correctly entered*.

Fall School Newsletter

Grade 9 immunizations are starting soon at school

Public Health will send home an immunization consent package for Grade 9 students.

When students are in Grade 9, we review their immunization records and offer all routine vaccines they need for their age.

When you receive the consent package, please do all of the following:

- Review the consent package, which includes past immunizations.
- Check that your immunization history report is complete.
 If it is not complete, you can submit the record one of these ways:
 - Include it with the signed consent form.
 - Submit it online to us at <u>FraserHealth.ca/immunizationform</u>.
- Talk with your parent or guardian about why vaccines are important.
- Complete and sign the consent form.
 Please note The consent is valid for 2 years unless you cancel it.
- Return the signed consent form, and updated immunization record if needed, to the school sealed in the envelope provided.

Your parent or guardian can consent for you or you can consent for yourself. When you consent for yourself, this is called a Mature Minor Consent.

Mature Minor Consent

Individuals under the age of 19 who are able to understand the benefits, common mild side effects, medical reasons to not receive a vaccine, and rare serious side effects for the vaccines, and the risk of not getting immunized, can legally consent to or refuse immunizations on their own. This means that you may decide whether or not to receive a vaccine. You are encouraged to review and discuss the information in this package with your parent or guardian. The Surrey School District is Committed to Truth & Reconciliation



Surrey Schools fulfills its vision for learning on the traditional, ancestral, and unceded territory of the Katzie, Kwantlen, Semiahmoo and other Coast Salish Peoples. Our role as a school district on unceded territory means

that in all of our actions, we must foreground our commitment to reconciliation with Indigenous peoples. True reconciliation and respect for Indigenous peoples means going beyond equity and inclusion and instead acknowledging the history and legacies of colonialism and taking stock of the ways individual and collective actions in our schools work to continue those trends or reverse them. Canada's actions in establishing, continuing, and defending the residential school system caused serious harm to Indigenous people. As British Columbia commits to fully implementing the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, our district reaffirms its commitments to both truth reconciliation as a means to address any systemic discrimination or inequities.

In Surrey, these commitments mean consistently acknowledging the land we are on, and paying the due respect to those Indigenous peoples who are its original inhabitants. By acknowledging whose land we are on, we not only give proper recognition to Indigenous peoples, but we enter into a framework for dialogue and growth in the relationship between Indigenous peoples and settlers, which emphasizes Indigenous peoples' rights to self-determination. The right to self-determination means that Indigenous students have a right to see their histories taught accurately to all students. It means that Indigenous students have a right to have their experiences and practices reflected in the school curriculum. It means that they have a right to social, cultural, and emotional support systems. It means that schools must equip all students with the tools for "intercultural understanding, empathy and respect," and all teachers with the training they need to accomplish that goal. Now and in the future, the district affirms our commitment to truth and reconciliation across our vision for learning.
