

Traffic safety around Fleetwood Park Secondary continues to be a critical priority for our community.

With increasing enrollment, the number of vehicles navigating around and within our school grounds also increases. It is essential that all drivers are very cautious while driving near the school and are aware of the many student pedestrians who are nearby. All students and parents/guardians are requested to consider the following:

- If possible, students please walk and/or bike to school. Fewer vehicles attempting to drop off and/or pick up students will be very helpful.
- Do not enter the school's parking lots for drop-off/pickup. Please drop off your children 2-3 blocks away from the school and avoid the traffic congestion around the school.
- Consider drop-off/pick up earlier and/or later in the morning/ afternoons to avoid peak traffic times.
- Do not turn left onto 80th Ave out of the school lot... this creates more traffic backlog.

Poor Weather & Darker Days Require Extra Caution When Traveling To & From School

November 4, 2022

As winter weather begins to settle in and daylight hours decrease, we remind drivers and pedestrians to take care and use extra caution when traveling to and from school.

According to ICBC, nearly half of all crashes with pedestrians happen between October and January and about 80 per cent of those happen at intersections.

Even when drivers are being cautious, heavy rain and fog can limit visibility on the road, making it difficult to see pedestrians.

We all need to do our part - here are some important tips:



Safe walking:

- . Cross only at marked or controlled crosswalks & follow traffic signals: Do not jaywalk or cross when it isn't your turn.
- Make eye contact with drivers as it's hard to see pedestrians when visibility is poor in fall & winter: Never assume a
 driver has seen you! Be certain they see you and that they've committed to coming to a stop.
- Watch for drivers turning left or right through the crosswalk: Drivers may be focused on oncoming traffic and not see you.
- Wait until a crossing guard says it's safe to cross: If your school has a crossing guard, follow their instructions before
 crossing they will make sure it's safe before guiding you across.
- Be as reflective as possible: This will make it easier for drivers to see you in wet weather, and at dawn and dusk.

Safe driving:

- Leave your phone alone: Distraction is the leading factor for drivers in crashed involving pedestrians and cyclists. Poor
 weather only makes it riskier.
- Scan crosswalks & intersections from left to right as you approach: Take extra care in school zones and near transit stops, especially when turning at intersections.
- Give yourself enough stopping distance: You need more time to stop when roads are wet or slippery or when you're
 driving fast. At a slower speed, motorists have better chance to react when children or others are crossing the road.
 This could be the difference that saves a life!
- Stick to the speed limit: A 30 km/h speed limit is in effect in school zones from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. every school day, unless otherwise posted. In playground zones, a 30 km/h speed limit is in effect every day from dawn to dusk.
- Notice if other drivers are slowing down or stopping: If a vehicle is stopped in front of you or in the lane next to you,
 they may be yielding to a pedestrian, so proceed with caution and be prepared to stop.

Whether driving, walking or cycling, expect the unexpected, stay alert and stay safe!

Vaccinations remain the best defence against COVID-19 and influenza.

Stay home if you are not feeling well or are experiencing symptoms including fever and/or chills, recent onset of coughing, or diarrhea.

The general guidelines are:

- For fever: stay home until you do not have a fever and feel well enough to return to your regular activities.
- For undiagnosed vomiting and diarrhea: Stay home until there has been 24 hours since your last episode.

Staff, students or visitors can attend school if their symptoms are consistent with a previously diagnosed health condition (e.g., seasonal allergies) or symptoms have improved enough to where you feel well enough to return to regular activities, and any fever has resolved without the use of fever-reducing medication (e.g. acetaminophen, ibuprofen).

if a staff member, student or visitor develops symptoms of illness while at school and is unable to participate in regular activities, they should go home until their symptoms have improved.



The decision to wear a mask or face covering is a personal choice for everyone. This choice will be supported and treated with respect in all our schools. Disposable masks will continue to be available at our sites for those who wish to use them.

Protect Yourself And Others This Cold And Flu Season!

Nobody likes being sick, and with cold and flu season upon us, it's up to all of us to help prevent the spread of communicable disease in our school communities.

B.C.'s Communicable Disease Guidelines for K-12 Settings remain important to the ongoing protection from and prevention of respiratory illness, including colds and flus. The health and safety of our classrooms is a team effort – students, staff and visitors are urged to stay home if they are not feeling well or are experiencing symptoms, including fever and/or chills, recent onset of coughing or diarrhea:

- · For uncontrolled fever: stay home until you do not have a fever and feel well enough to return to your regular activities.
- For undiagnosed vomiting and diarrhea: stay home until there has been 24 hours since your last episode.

In addition to staying home when you're sick, there are a few other ways you can keep yourself from getting sick and from spreading illness to others:

- · Wash your hands regularly: Practise frequent hand hygiene to prevent the spread of germs and respiratory illness.
- . Cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze. Cough and sneeze into your elbow instead of your hands.
- Get your recommended vaccinations. <u>Flu shots</u> are free to everyone in B.C. six months and older, and are available as
 a shot or a nasal spray. BC residents 6 months and older are also encouraged to get their <u>COVID vaccinations</u>.

Staff, students or visitors may attend school if their symptoms are consistent with a previously diagnosed health condition such as seasonal allergies, or if their symptoms have improved to where they feel well enough to return to regular activities, and any fever has resolved without the use of fever-reducing medication (i.e. acetaminophen, ibuprofen).

If a staff member, student or visitor develops symptoms of illness while at school and is unable to participate in regular activities, they should go home until their symptoms have improved.

Financial Support

Financial support to make school more affordable for families that need it most.

In late August, the provincial government announced \$60 million in one-time funding to school districts in B.C. — including \$7.385 million to Surrey Schools — to make school more affordable for students and families.

Our district has now received this funding and has allocated amounts to all of our schools. Moving forward, these funds will be used to support families struggling with the rising cost of living due to inflation. We can use these funds at our school to ensure students can continue to participate fully in school, despite challenging financial situations. These funds can be used to help with school supplies, food and clothing costs, and additional fees so that students in need can take part in activities, such as field trips.

Families are encouraged to reach out to principals, teachers, or their school office staff if any financial support is needed for school-based supplies or activities.

This week our Student Council began decorating the school ... it's beginning to look a lot like Christmas!






Principal's Message ~ continued
