Course Description/Theme:

This course covers European and North American history from 1750 to 1914 and focuses on the development of society in culture, politics and law, economy technology, and the environment. There will also be particular attention paid to the application of social studies and the development of open, fair, reflective, and critical mindedness.

The theme of the course is quote "social change" and we will use it to explore the ideas of community building, cultural change, revolution, and nation building. By utilizing this theme, you will understand an experience your own community, the various interactions that occur between societies, reasons why a people occur in society, and how nations are formed.

Specific content to be studied with regard to Canadian history includes colonization, Rebellions of 1837-38, Confederation in 1867, Louis Riel, the mistreatment of our aboriginal peoples and more. In terms of international content, we will cover the Industrial Revolution, the French Revolution, global imperialism along with much more.

Big Ideas:

- o Emerging ideas and ideologies profoundly influence societies and events.
- The physical environment influences the nature of political, social, and economic change.
- Disparities in power alter the balance of relationships between individuals and between societies.
- o Collective identity is constructed and can change over time
