The Surrey Schools Welcome Centre provides free transition and settlement support to all newcomer and English Language Learner families new to the school district. Allergy-aware Schools

The Surrey School District strives to keep schools safe for all students and staff. Where there is a student with a life-threatening allergy, school staff, students, and parents work together to make the school "allergy-aware" and prepare a plan to reduce the risk of student exposure to the allergen.



Anaphylaxis is a severe, life-threatening allergic reaction. Reactions are often rapid and may occur within seconds of exposure to even the smallest amounts of the allergen. Immediate medical treatment is required when a reaction occurs. Examples of life-threatening allergens are peanuts, tree nuts and nut products, shellfish, cow's milk,

Communicating Student Learning is a process through which the schools share assessment results with parents so they can better support their child. The goal of CSL is to have an on-going discussion between students, parents, and teachers about the student's learning. This is not limited to report cards. Lockers are usually assigned to students in high school for use during the school year. Lockers are to be used for the storage of books, school supplies and equipment, outerwear, school sports equipment and lunches. No other material is permitted except with the written authority of the principal or vice principal. Lockers are to be kept clean and food removed on a regular basis.
