ORIENTATION TO CANADA

As a newcomer, you may have many questions about your transition to life in Canada. Settlement Service Organizations are funded by Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada and can help you with exploring career options and finding employment, learning about getting your foreign credentials recognized, introducing you to community services and resources, helping you to register your children for school, finding government information, finding free language classes and much more.

EMERGENCIES:

9-1-1 for Emergencies:

In most places in B.C., the emergency phone number for fire, police, and ambulance is 9-1-1. The 9-1-1 call is free. When you call 9-1-1, an operator will answer the phone. The operator will ask if you need police, fire, or ambulance. 9-1-1 is for police, fire, or medical emergencies when immediate action is required: someone's health, safety, or property is in jeopardy, or a crime is in progress.

Non-emergency numbers & online crime reporting – Surrey:

FAMILY RESOURCES:

BC211 can help you find government and community services you may need. These include counselling, employment, child care, financial assistance, food, senior services, housing, legal services, immigrant services, education, arts and culture, recreation, health services, and support groups. The service is free and confidential (private). It is offered in many languages. Toll-free: 2-1-1 or www.bc211.ca

VictimLinkBC is a toll-free, confidential telephone service offered in many languages. It provides information and referral services to all victims of crime. It also provides immediate crisis support to victims of family and sexual violence, including victims of human trafficking exploited for labour or sexual services. Crisis Centres and Crisis Lines are staffed by people you can talk to. They can also help you find resources. All calls are free, and services are available in many languages. The following crisis lines can help you in time of need:

- The Kids Help Phone is for children and youth. They give information and support to young people with any kind of problem. You can call, text, or access their mobile app or website 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. You do not have to tell them your name. HEALTH CARE

Registering for Medical Services Plan (MSP)

All residents of B.C. must be registered with the Medical Services Plan (MSP). You need to apply to register for MSP. On your application, make sure you write your name exactly as it appears on other official documents. You should register for MSP as soon as you arrive in B.C. You may have to wait for up to 3 months for your application to be processed. If you do not have MSP, you should buy private medical insurance. If you need medical care in B.C. and you do not have MSP or private medical insurance, you will have to pay all medical costs yourself. These costs can be very high. HealthLink BC

HealthLink BC provides free non-emergency health information and advice in B.C. Information and advice is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by telephone, website, a mobile app, and printable information. All of HealthLink BC's services are free. HealthLink BC does not provide emergency services. If you have an urgent medical situation, call 9-1-1. www.healthlinkbc.ca

Finding a family doctor

If you live in British Columbia and need a family doctor or <u>nurse practitioner</u>, register for the Health Connect Registry. When you register, you are added to a centralized registry of primary care providers across your community. Registration takes less than 10 minutes. You need to provide: Personal Health Number (PHN), found on your BC Services Card, your home address, and your email address and phone number.
