of their high school years is by joining a club or team sport.


Earl Marriott has over 30 clubs that are running this year, and many of our teams have been bringing home banners and medals at tournaments and races around the Lower Mainland.

The staff of Earl Marriott continues to be engaged this school year in discussions and workshops centered around curriculum changes, which are now fully implemented in Grades 8 and 9, and being piloted in Grades 10-12. There are fundamental changes coming to the graduation program in British Columbia, and parents are encouraged to keep checking the curriculum website for up to date information (curriculum.gov.bc.ca). Families will notice some of the changes to the curriculum in the way students are asked to demonstrate their learning and how that learning is reported out to parents. At our Admin Day on Sept. $24^{\text {th }}$, we reviewed curricular change and the integration of Core Competencies (Communication, Thinking, Personal/Social). In October, many of our teachers went around the Lower Mainland to conferences and workshops.

Some of you will have noticed the large trailer in our parking lot on Oct. $16^{\text {th }}$ and $17^{\text {th }}$. We were fortunate to have been chosen as a location for the Global Development Exhibition, as it goes across the country. Students were given workshops in both English and French over two days in this moveable exhibition space. Thank you to Ms. Bakgaard for her initiative in bringing us this great opportunity. 1. Parents should have received the first interim reports from Term 1 last week. This first interim is an early indicator of work habits that are being demonstrated in the classroom. The interim may not necessarily reflect an established work habit, but it can be used as an early indication of attendance concerns or areas in need of improvement. Parents may follow up the interim report with an interview to check on their child's progress to date and discuss strategies for support. Our first formal report for the year will be on November 22nd. We have added to this newsletter a parent MyEd BC Portal Guide. Please keep it handy as a reference to the many times you will need to access the portal for report cards, course selection, checking absences, etc.

Our first Parent Interviews were held on Thursday Oct. 19th. It was a very well attended evening and our Leadership students did an excellent job helping out and keeping things moving. Thank you to all the parents who came out to meet with the teachers. If you were unable to attend, and have a concern or question, please contact the teachers through email.

This month has been an important one for Grade 12 students and their parents.

- Our PAC has sponsored a visit from Options Solutions on Tuesday Oct. $24^{\text {th }}$ at 7:00 pm. This workshop is for both parents and students and focusses on the journey of post-secondary entrance, applications and scholarship research.
- Grade 12 students have been attending ongoing visits from post-secondary institutions. A calendar is located on our website. Thank you to our career centre staff who bring in representatives from all of the major universities and colleges to speak with our students. In addition to these university visits, students have been attending last day of the month Friday lunch sessions on Grad information, including post-secondary decision making and dealing with the stress of deadlines and applications.
- Grade 12 students will participate in the next two major social events of the year: Grad Fashion Show on Nov. $23^{\text {rd }}$ and Grad Cruise on Nov. $30^{\text {th }}$.

Fall sports are well underway at Earl Marriott. I would like to thank all the coaches that have stepped up this fall and given our athletes the opportunity to compete. School Athletics doesn't happen without the support of many volunteers. Our Volleyball teams and Cross-country team have both moved forward in their divisions. Our Senior Boys

## Halloween fireworks safety

Every Halloween, children and adults are seriously injured and sometimes killed by fireworks.

According to Surrey and White Rock city bylaws, it is illegal for any person to be in the possession of fireworks of any kind.

The only exception is for persons who have a valid federal supervisor's certificate from the Explosives Regulatory Division of Natural Resources Canada. However, city permits must be obtained and other restrictions still apply.


The penalty for violating the bylaw is a fine of up to $\$ 5,000$ and seizure of the fireworks.

Any fireworks brought on school property will be confiscated and students involved face suspension.

## The Parking Lot: An Update

We are now two months into the school year, which means we ware also two months into our newly harmonized schedule. When we first discussed making the change to a unified schedule, one of the concerns was the potential for added congestion in the parking lot.

Apart from the understandable hiccups associated with a new learning curve, we feel the transition has gone relatively smoothly. Moreover, we would like to express our gratitude to our parents for their patience, understanding, and support as we have worked through this process.

A few gentle reminders:

- The "Main Entrance" to the school is only for dropping off students, since it only accesses the bus loop/drop-off lane way.
- The Main Entrance "intersection" has two lanes merging into one: traffic coming off of $16^{\text {th }}$ Ave heading west (turning left) into the bus loop/drop-off lane way AND traffic leaving the main parking area (turning right) to enter the bus loop/drop-off lane way (and exit the property onto $16^{\text {th }}$ Ave).
- This "intersection" is controlled by a stop sign-this sign controls traffic leaving the main parking lot as it enters the bus loop/drop-off lane way; therefore, traffic coming off of $16^{\text {th }}$ Ave has the right of way.
- When using the "Main Entrance", please move through the "bus loop" area and drop off along the straight stretch of the lane way between the school building and $16^{\text {th }}$ Avenue.
- If you happen to stop in the "bus loop", please move all the way forward AND pull tight against the curb to allow other vehicles pass on your left.

- Please ensure all drop-offs are safe and efficient (re: quick).
- Note: With the bus loop/drop-off lane way, the busses have priority, so please prepared to be moved or temporarily held-up as we guide the busses into their drop-off zones.

Tips/Hints:

- When dropping off or picking up your child, we suggest doing so off campus, either across the street (south side of $16^{\text {th }}$ Ave) or at one of the nearby parks (Maccaud or Alderwood), thus reducing the congestion in the parking lot.
- If you are on site to pick up your child, we encourage you to use a vacant staff parking stall while you are waiting for your child, rather than create congested and unsafe line ups along the lane ways between parking rows.
