their learning. At the school, we are committing to speaking with students and encouraging them, communicating to parents when there is a concern, and following through with support when needed. Parents can expect phone calls or emails from the school when classes are missed, and a letter from the administration when there have been more than 4 days of unexcused absences. We encourage families to contact the school whenever there is an excused absence, or if there is a concern or question. Thank you for your support in helping us by encouraging your children to attend all classes, and by letting us know when they will be absent due to illness or an appointment.

Parents should have received the first **interim reports** from Term 1 last week. This first interim is an early indicator of work habits that are being demonstrated in the classroom. The interim may not necessarily reflect an established work habit, but it can be used as an early indication of attendance concerns or areas in need of improvement. Parents may follow up the interim report with an interview at the Parent Teacher Conference day on Thursday, Nov. 1st. Interview times may be scheduled on line. Check our website for details. This is a good opportunity to further check on your child's progress to date and discuss strategies for support. **Our first formal report for the year will be on Thursday, November 22nd.**

This month will be an important one for **Grade 12 students** and their parents.

The Grade 12's will be celebrating the first term of their Grad year at the Grad Cruise on Thursday, Oct. 25th. On Nov. 22nd, they will participate in the Grad Fashion Show, a Mariner tradition. We encourage everyone to come out and support these events.

Grade 12 students have been attending ongoing visits from post-secondary institutions. A calendar is located on our website. Thank you to our career centre staff who bring in representatives from all of the major universities and colleges to speak with our students. In addition to these university visits, students have been attending lunch sessions on Grad information, including post-secondary decision making and dealing with the stress of deadlines and applications.

Oct. 24th is the Annual Post-Secondary Institutions Evening. This South Surrey event is being held at Earl Marriott this year. It is a great opportunity to meet with Faculty advisors and recruitment teams from the Universities and colleges. UBC will be coming to speak to students on Wednesday Oct. 24th at 6:00 pm in the Theatre.

Fall sports are well underway at Earl Marriott. I would like to thank all the coaches that have stepped up this fall and given our athletes the opportunity to compete. School Athletics doesn't happen without the support of many volunteers. Our Volleyball teams, Boys Soccer, Football, Swimming and Cross-country team have all moved forward in their divisions. Our Cross-country teams did exceptionally well in the Fraser Valleys and many will be heading to the Provincial Championships in Nanaimo. Parents are reminded that the next Professional Day will be on **Friday, November 9**th, prior to Remembrance Day on Nov. 11th. New Cannabis Control and Licensing Act

Please be aware of the following violation amendments related to the consumption or possession of cannabis while at school, or on adjacent grounds. Students may be fined by RCMP in the following circumstances:

Vape cannabis or hold activated cannabis device in an outdoor public place	\$58
Smoke or hold lighted cannabis in indoor public place (school)	\$230
Vape cannabis or hold activated cannabis device in indoor public place	\$58
Smoke or hold lighted cannabis at bus stop or similar place, including an area abutting	
School property	\$230
Vape cannabis or hold activated cannabis device at bus stop or similar place	\$58

Smoking, vaping and the possession or use of cannabis while at school is a violation of the Code of Conduct.



Marijuana (cannabis) and schools

District policies regarding cannabis are consistent with provincial and federal laws, and similar in approach to district policies regarding alcohol or tobacco.

Minor students (18 years and younger)

- The possession of cannabis and cannabis products in British Columbia is limited to adults 19 years or older. A minor must not possess, consume, produce, supply, sell, purchase or attempt to purchase cannabis, nor market, advertise or promote cannabis. In addition, minors cannot possess, make, supply, sell, purchase or attempt to purchase a cannabis accessory (equipment related to cannabis use, production, etc.).
- A minor must not operate a vehicle, whether or not the vehicle is in motion, while there is cannabis in the vehicle.
- If a student is found in possession of what is believed to be cannabis or a cannabis-infused product, the product will be confiscated. Further actions may also be taken against the student.

Adults (19 years and older)

- Adults cannot consume cannabis in any form in or on school property.
- Adults cannot smoke or vape cannabis in or on public spaces such as skating rinks, sports fields, swimming pools, playgrounds or skate parks (noteworthy for adults in adjacent schools).
- Adults cannot consume cannabis while operating a vehicle or consume cannabis while in a vehicle being operated by another person. An adult must not operate a vehicle if the adult knows that another person is smoking or vaping cannabis in the vehicle.

Dear Parent / Guardians:

Re: Community Youth Activities "Grad Pranks"

We share the pride of accomplishment and look forward to joining you in congratulating the class of 2019. However, in past years there have been troubling incidents of unsafe behaviour and acts of vandalism involving youth in our neighbourhoods participating in reckless events, often characterized as grad activities. Such events are a trend, not just in our school district, but in other communities as well. We are asking for your help in ensuring your son or daughter is aware that unsafe and unacceptable behaviours can have serious consequences.

It is important that we work together to ensure that our young people do not take part in, or condone (provoke, encourage, or support):

- Bullying, cyberbullying, harassment, threat(s) or intimidation;
- Violence of any form;
- Verbal, physical or sexual abuse;
- Discrimination in any form;
- Theft:
- Unsafe or dangerous activities
- Vandalism:
- Possession or use of intoxicating or banned substances;
- Possession or use of weapons (or replica weapons) and explosives

Youth involved in these types of activities may face criminal and school consequences, including losing the privilege to attend extra-curricular events such as the grad ceremony and banquet. Students may also face suspension from school and/or criminal charges. Given that positive citizenship is often considered in selection for school and district scholarships, poor decisions can also impact those award possibilities. Parents are also financially responsible for damage caused by their children – please see the attached School Act excerpt. We ask that you understand the school's and district's position in taking the necessary disciplinary steps in circumstances where inappropriate behaviour occurs.

We also fully support your decision to <u>not permit your son or daughter to attend unsupervised events</u>. We often hear about camping trips, parties or trips to vacation spots like Whistler which are not organized by the district, parents or the school. Our shared goal of safety for all of our young people is compromised when these events occur. If you are uncertain about the status of an event please give school administration a call. We would be happy to clarify if this is an event supported by the school or the district. Each year in B.C., there are tragic events associated with "grad activities" that could be avoided through increased awareness and clear expectations.

BC Ministry of Education Governance and Legislation Branch C-1 April 16, 2009 REVISED STATUTES OF BRITISH COLUMBIA, 1996

Division 3 - Joint Rights and Duties Liability for damage to property

10 If property of a board or a francophone education authority is destroyed, damaged, lost or converted by the intentional or negligent act of a student or a francophone student, that student and that student's parents are jointly and severally liable to the board or francophone education authority in respect of the act of that student.


