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Principal's Message

Focus on Digital Citizenship

As part of our school plan, our staff has been engaged in discussions around our Code of Conduct. So far this year, we have focused on Attendance and a Respectful Learning Environment. This month, our focus has turned to personal devices and, in particular, cell phone use in the classroom. We value learning in the classroom, and need to create environments that encourage engagement and focus. As a staff, we also believe it is our responsibility to educate students in digital citizenship.

Our current policy reads:

Many students at EMS now carry cell phones. It is important that they use them properly. Mobile devices can be used as a powerful learning tool; however, if students are unable to use their cell phones in an appropriate manner, administration may, at their discretion, confiscate them or ban a student from bringing them to school. Mobile devices should only be used to enhance learning and should not interfere with the learning environment. The use of these devices during instructional time is at the discretion of the teachers in each class. It is important that students turn them off, remove earplugs, and put them away when asked to by their teachers. Failing to respond to a teacher's request could result in consequences given by an administrator and potentially the confiscation of the device.

As a staff, we feel the policy allows for responsible use of personal technology for educational purposes. We do believe that it is our shared responsibility to educate and inform students around responsible use. Cell phones have become a distraction to learning in the classroom when used for social purposes, particularly when students are communicating through text or messaging, or when connected to social media and gaming Apps.

To that end, we are educating our students and advising our parent community that cell phones should not be taken out or used during class for social purposes. Students will also be asked to remove earbuds and in-ear headphones when in class. Teachers have the discretion to allow students to use their phones when appropriate, for research or as an educational tool. Many of our teachers integrate the use of cell phones into their daily lessons to support the learning. Students who do not bring phones to school will be provided with technology as needed.

If the student's use of a phone in a classroom is problematic, and the request to put the phone away is not followed, the administration may keep the phone in the office and contact parents. We would encourage parents to continue the conversation of appropriate technology use at home. In case of emergency, if a student needs to be reached during class time by a parent, it is best to contact the school directly (604) 531-8354.

Dear Parents/Guardians:

Regular Bus Service for 2019-2020 School Year

Students who are residents of the cities of Surrey or White Rock and who meet the following criteria, will be considered eligible for regular school bus transportation to and from their catchment school. This will apply to all students regardless of their busing history.

a) Kindergarten to Grade 3

Kindergarten to Grade 3 students who live in a residence that is located *more than 4 km* walking distance from their catchment school.

b) Grade 4 to Grade 12

Grades 4 to 12 students who live in a residence that is located *more than 4.8 km walking distance* from their catchment school.

c) Sale of Bus Passes

Courtesy rider passes may be purchased by resident students who are not otherwise eligible for transportation. The 2019-2020 pricing is \$300/year per student. Siblings will be charged \$150 per year. Purchased passes are subject to the following conditions:

- 1) Established routes cannot not be altered to accommodate purchased pass holders
- 2) The availability of space on the bus will be established after all "eligible" students have been accommodated. Extra seats will be awarded first to those that apply prior to June 28, 2019, regardless of previous busing history. Seats will be assigned in the following priority:
 - a) Distance from the school
 - b) Age of the student
 - c) Outside of catchment
- 3) The fee for a pass is a yearly fee, regardless of use or the number of school days in each month
- 4) Fee payment must be provided to the school office in advance of bus service

Should you wish to request regular bus services please complete and sign the attached "Request for Bus Transportation" form along with the signed "Passenger Guidelines" and return to the school or email to FACL-transportation-mail@surreyschools.ca.

PASSENGER GUIDELINES

- Students must have a bus pass or the written authority of their principal to ride a school bus, and are only permitted to ride their assigned bus, unless approval from the school is given. A pass must be shown every time the student boards the bus. Students may be refused to ride without a pass.
- 2. Friends without a pass are not permitted to ride without a temporary pass provided by the school office. A parent or guardian of the friend must provide authorization to the school in advance of the student riding the bus. Space must be available on the bus.
- 3. Students are expected to be at their pick-up point 5 minutes before bus arrival time.
- 4. Notifications of late or cancelled buses will be sent via the school's App. Students and parents can subscribe to their bus number in the groups section of the App to receive the notifications.
- 5. Students may be assigned seats by the driver. Once seated, students must stay in their seats.
- 6. Eating of lunches and snacks may be allowed at the discretion of the driver. When permitted, drinks must be in spill proof containers. If abused, this privilege may be suspended. No litter shall be left on the bus by students.
- 7. Small band instruments, or other carry-on items may be taken on the bus provided the item:
 - a) Will fit safely on the student's lap
 - b) Does not sit higher than the seat in front
 - c) Is properly housed or contained in an approved case/container
 - d) Will not create unsafe conditions for other passengers
- 8. Smoking, vaping, lighters/matches, graffiti, loud talking, loud media devices, or distracting the driver are strictly prohibited.
- 9. Windows and emergency doors are only to be used at the direction of the driver.
- 10. Disrespect, inappropriate behaviour or the use of profanity is not acceptable.
- 11. If, in the opinion of the driver, students are behaving in such a fashion as to cause driver distraction or fellow passenger danger, the driver may return the students to the pick-up point or drop them off at the nearest school and place them in the charge of that principal. The principal will contact the parents or guardians concerned to arrange transportation of the students.

Girls Soccer Program Host Oakhill College


