There is a feeling of optimism as we enter the final Quarter of this school year, and spend many lunchtimes and afternoons in the warm sunshine and open air. You should have received the Third Quarter formal report card, which was posted for students and parents in MyEdBC on Friday, April 23rd. This year, all students will be working in their final quarter classes until Friday, June 18th, with an opportunity for completion activities with their teachers June 21st – 24th. Completion days are opportunities for students to complete missed exams, and finish off final assignments. The Grade 10 Literacy and Numeracy Assessment is scheduled in the last week of school, with final report cards published on Thursday, June 24th. This has been a very unusual year, with many changes and protocols, but there is always time to en-

gage with your final two courses, and finish the year off with success. Please use all of the supports available at the school to stay focused and organized. If there are any questions or concerns about your son or daughter's progress, please contact your teacher directly through email.

Similar to last Spring, there were many events on our school calendar that have now passed us by, and many more to come where we will not be able to gather as we typically would. Our staff is busy planning two final events for the students: **Student Recognition Evening** and a **Commencement Event** for our Graduates, to honour them and celebrate this moment in their lives. We hope that, like last year, it will be a day to remember, if not exactly like they had imagined. It is important to remember that, despite all of the 'things missed', plans are moving forward as they should for many of our students and our Grade 12's in particular. We have received news that several of our students have been offered tremendous scholarships, and this month many will begin to receive letters of acceptance to University and post-secondary programs. Timetable and Registration 2021/2022 – We are continuing to move forward with our timetable building for September 2021. All of our students chose their courses prior to Spring Break, and will receive a verification of their courses prior to the end of the school year. The timetable is being constructed in the same format as this year: classes scheduled in the Quarter system, Grade 8 and 9 students scheduled in cohort groups, Grade 10 -12 students in afternoon Blended classes. Our hope, along with everyone, is that we will be able to return to full classes and the semester system before the year is through. We have met online with our Elementary teachers and Admin to prepare for the welcome of our Grade 8 students next year. As always, if you have concerns or questions about your courses, please contact your alpha counselor. Students and families new to the Earl Marriott area may complete a registration form online, which can be found on our website.

Our School District has implemented new Health and Safety protocols since Spring Break, in response to the increase in COVID numbers in our surrounding community. Schools that are more affected are also implementing targeted and intensive measures. At Earl Marriott, we have maintained many of these protocols since the beginning of the school year, with the support of our staff and students. The following **one-hour early dismissal dates** for 2020-2021 were approved by the Board at its meeting on April 14th, 2021:

April 30th, May 14th, June 7th, 2021

These early dismissal days are to provide an opportunity for school-based health & safety committees and school staff to review and revisit health & safety plans, discuss recommendations, and implement or adjust any COVID-19 mitigation strategies. Students will be dismissed from classes one hour earlier on each of these days.

We recognize that there are many exams and deadlines for the students as we move quickly through Spring. Please use all of the supports available at the school to stay focused and organized and check the website regularly for information about upcoming events.







LET'S KEEP OUR SCHOOLS SAFE

The Surrey School District recognizes the importance of face-to-face learning and is committed to ensuring our students can continue to learn as safely as possible by following all appropriate measures to limit the spread of illness.

Students in Kindergarten and grades 1-3 are encouraged to wear a mask.


Wear your mask safely – ensure it is clean and dry, is a good fit, covers your nose and mouth fully. And remember, don't touch your face or play with your mask.
