Principal's Message:

We are now well into Quarter 4 with the end of the school year only nine weeks away. We are busy balancing our learning focus while also keeping the safety of our community at the forefront of all of our planning. As always this is an exciting time in schools as our students work towards successful completion of another school year.

The Ministry of Education, Provincial Health Office, and BC Centre for Disease Control have provided school districts with amendments to the K-12 health and safety guidelines. These amendments have been introduced as an extra layer of protection in response to recent increases in COVID-19 cases, variants of concern, transmission rates and more severe cases in B.C., in particular, in the Lower Mainland and in our health region, Fraser Health.

We ask for your support in the following ways:

- Please send your child to school with a clean mask that they are used to wearing, and a spare mask. Schools will have disposable masks available if students forget their masks.
- Please remind your child(ren) that they should not remove their masks to eat or drink while walking through common areas of the school. Masks should only be removed for the purposes of eating and drinking where a person is relatively stationary (e.g. sitting in their classroom).
- Out of school, please ensure your child avoids gathering with anyone indoors from outside of your household and limit outdoor gatherings to the same group of 10.
- Keep your child at home if they don't feel well. Complete the daily health check every day.
- Remind your child to maintain at least two metres physical distance from others when outside of their cohort, and to wash/sanitize their hands frequently.

Students at Kwantlen Park will be dismissed at 1:35 on the early dismissal days.

Unfortunately, we are unable to safely hold our traditional Kwantlen Park Secondary grad activities this year. We are currently in the planning stages for our Grad 2021 Commencement Ceremonies during the day on Saturday June 19th. We will be scheduling times for students to attend within their Q4 cohorts over the duration of the day. Students, and families, should plan on holding that day open until we are able to distribute a final schedule of the time individual students should arrive and the guidelines around who will be able to attend with the student. As of right now we are awaiting further direction from Fraser Health on how many individuals we will be able to invite to the ceremony.

Daily Health Check:

Below is a daily health check that parents might want to complete with their child before they leave home for school if they are feeling sick! This useful checklist is provided by our school district's health and safety department to help keep all students and staff safe!

*Check BCCDC's Symptoms of COVID-19 regularly to ensure the list is up to date.

If you answered "YES" to one of the questions included under 'Key Symptoms of Illness' (excluding fever), you should stay home for 24 hours from when the symptom started. If the symptom improves, you may return to theschool/district site when you feel well enough. If the symptom persists or worsens, seek a health assessment.

If you answered "YES" to two or more of the questions included under 'Symptoms of Illness' or you have a fever, seek a health assessment. A health assessment includes calling 8-1-1, or a primary care provider like a physician or nurse practitioner. If a health assessment is required, you should not return to the school/district site until COVID-19 has been excluded and your symptoms have improved.

When a COVID-19 test is recommended by the health assessment:

- If the COVID-19 test is positive, you should stay home until you are told by public health to end selfisolation. In most cases this is 10 days after the onset of symptoms. Public health will contact everyone with a positive test
- If the COVID-19 test is negative, you can return to the school/district site once symptoms have improved and you feel
 well enough. Symptoms of common respiratory illnesses can persist for a week or more. Re- testing is not needed unless
 you develop a new illness.
- If a COVID-19 test is recommended but is not done because you choose not to have the test, or you donot seek a
 health assessment when recommended, and your symptoms are not related to a previously diagnosed health
 condition, you should stay home from the school/district site until 10 days after the onset of symptoms, and then you
 may return if you are feeling well enough.

If a COVID-19 test is not recommended by the health assessment, you can return to the school/district site when symptoms improve and you feel well enough. Testing may not be recommended if the assessment determines that the symptoms are due to another cause (i.e. not COVID-19).

If you answered "YES" to questions 2 or 3, use the COVID-19 Self-Assessment Tool to determine if you should seek testing for COVID-19

A health-care provider note (i.e. a doctor's note) should not be required to confirm the health status of any individual.

General Safety Protocols for all students:

To help ensure staff and student safety, students should only show up at their scheduled time and follow these safety guidelines:

Prior to coming to school, students must ensure they are healthy and feeling well.

- Do not come to school if COVID symptoms are present. For example: new or worsening cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, temperature equal to or over 38°C, feeling feverish, chills, fatigue or weakness, muscle or body aches, new loss of smell or taste, headache.
- Students have been provided with two reusable face masks. Students must wear non-medical masks in all indoor areas, including when they are with their learning groups.
- Upon arrival at school, students must ENTER through one of two entrance areas: The main entry doors, and the Den doors. All other doors will be locked.
- Upon entry, students must use the hand sanitizer provided and proceed directly to their classrooms. As a precaution, students should wear masks as they could be entering the building with students outside of their cohort.
- Please come to school as close to the start time as possible as we do not want overcrowding outside the entry points. When exiting the building please do not loiter. You are to leave directly from school property.
- Non-medical masks are required in high traffic areas such as buses and in common areas such as hallways, or anytime outside of their learning group whenever physical distancing cannot be maintained.
- Exceptions will be made for students who cannot wear a mask for medical reasons.
- Please follow the directional arrows in the building.
- Students must enter the classroom one at a time, in a socially distanced and patient manner.
- When in the classroom, students are to remain in the desk assigned to them.
- If students need to use the washroom, the teacher will ensure that only one person goes
 to the washroom at a time. When you exit and enter the classroom you need to hand
 sanitize. If the washroom is occupied, please wait outside in the hallway in a socially
 distanced space.
- Washrooms: some student washrooms will be closed, except for a number of universal bathrooms and few specific washrooms throughout the school; please use those if you need. This will help us sanitize bathrooms quickly.
- Students must engage in proper 20-second hand washing prior to leaving the washroom.
- At lunch, it is best to go outside and stay within your cohort whenever possible. If in contact with peers in different cohorts you will need to maintain physical distance of 2 meters and/or wear a mask.
- If a student is unable to physically distance, the student should only socialize within their cohort unless they are supported by an adult who can help the student physically distance from others.
- Hand hygiene: During the day, students must wash their hands regularly and use the hand sanitizer provided.
- Physical distancing: Students must avoid close greetings (ex: hugs, handshakes). When
 in the hallways, students must always be mindful of maintaining a 2-meter distance
 from others and/or wear a mask.
- At the end of the school day, students are to safely exit the school as soon as possible.
- **Water Bottles:** all students may bring water bottles to class if they wish; all water fountains except bottle dispensers are turned off.



WOMEN SEEN AS KEY TO REDUCING BC LABOUR SHORTAGE

Excerpt from Business in Vancouver article:

Women seen as key to reducing B.C.'s labour shortage

As B.C. looks to pull itself out of its COVID-induced economic lull, the sectors expecting to be the economy's major engines – mining, resources, construction, and transportation – are struggling with skilled-labour shortages that could be resolved quickly if industry leaders looked in the right direction, observers say.

The key demographic that could provide the answer, they say, is women. According to B.C. advocates, educators, and tradespeople, the potential for skilled female workers to offset the shortage of electricians, heavy-machinery operators, automotive repair technicians, and other trades is huge in a province needing to maximize its workforce.
