Evaluating a website

Why should you evaluate a web page you are just about to use for a project?

The reason is simple. There is no police on the World Wide Web who deletes, corrects or evaluates what is there. Therefore the job is yours to do.

Websites are a great source of quick information on a variety of topics but anyone can go on the internet and create a page on the web. Wikipedia is also a great source of information when you are looking for a quick answer but anyone can go on Wikipedia and change everything at any time. You might think that this is good if pages on Wikipedia are constantly up-dated. Yes, but who is up-dating the page and who wrote the article in the first place?

An expert or a grade 7 student from the local Elementary school?

In the end, you have to decide if the information is accurate, up-todate and useful to you.

If you take a few minutes to look at the web site you want to use and apply the following five criteria to evaluating Web pages, your chances of creating a better project will be improved.

Five quick and easy Criteria to evaluate a Webpage

- > Accuracy. Is the information accurate? Check your information against other sources. Do not use a single source.
- ➤ Authority. Who is the author of the site? Is it an individual, an institution, government, a company, etc.? Some domains may be better than others.

Might be better

- edu = Higher Learning Institutions (Universities)
- .gov = Government
- org = Non-profit organizations

Be careful

.com. = Business

If you see this symbol in a URL, \sim , it indicates that the site was created by an individual. Check his/her background.

Look at the address (URL) of the website for any useful information.

- ➤ **Objectivity.** If your page provides accurate information with limited advertising and it is objective in presenting the information. If it is a company webpage, is it objective and free of bias?
- Currency. If the Web page current and updated and are the links working and are they also up-to-date.
- Coverage. Is there enough information on the webpage to be useful?

To quickly evaluate a Web page, use the following questionnaire. The more times you answer yes to the questions, the better the Web page may be. If you check mark many BEWARE, make a decision to either abandon this page or make sure you check the facts with another websites, books, or encyclopedia.
