

- Theories of child development, including cultural influences, and how and why theories change over time
- Stages of child development from birth to age 12, including cognitive, social, physical, and emotional development and learning
- Nutritional needs and feeding practices for children for children of various ages including external influences on these practices
- Theories of caregiving styles and impacts on child development

- Child care options locally and internationally, influences on these options, and community resources that offer services to children and caregivers
- Service strategies for children and families

- Considerations for individual and family needs with respect to living space
- Laws and regulations related to shelter and housing
- Financial considerations involved in housing
