

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

PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY

The 2023-24 Physical Geography classes emphasised the idea of place-based learning this year by utilising the community outside of school, to apply, and inform, their classroom learning. Since September, the Geography-of-Foods class developed and nurtured a vegetable garden here at Grandview Heights. Throughout the year, they learned about the climactic challenges associated with growing food, as well as concepts like companion planting, soil health, and harvesting techniques. Students used this valuable experience to approach more sophisticated concepts like sustainability, food security, and food equity. In April, students went to the UBC Farm, worked with the Squamish Climate Action Network at Howe Sound Secondary, and visited the Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre in Whistler to explore how those concepts are currently being used in the community, while also considering how Indigenous-ways-of-knowing could be applied to our current food production and distribution systems. With the increased stress a growing population is putting on the land, coupled with the effects of climate change, agricultural awareness is as important as ever.

Other Physical Geography classes explored the Sea-to-Sky corridor this year in November and again in May. Making stops at Whytecliff Park, Lion's Bay, Shannon Falls, and Brandywine Falls, Geography students applied the knowledge learned in class to explain and document their analysis of the processes and features that shape the land. While in Whistler Village, students examined how the physical environment impacts everything from architecture to the economy. Place-based learning allows students

to see the world in a more holistic manner, where tectonic, gradational and atmospheric processes all work together to form the beautiful province we live in. Working in small groups, the end result is a 30-minute documentary or their experience going up the Sea-to-Sky corridor.

MUSIC PROGRAM NEWS

The GH Music Program has had a busy and successful Spring! In February, our four jazz ensembles participated in the Surrey Jazz Festival and received excellent feedback from the adjudicators. Three of these groups were invited to participate in MusicFest Canada, a national music festival. Our Grade 9 Intermediate Jazz Band was invited to perform in the Showcase Concert on the final evening of the festival and were named one of the top junior bands in the festival. Three of our students won awards for their excellent performances: Outstanding Junior Pianist, Outstanding Guitar Performance, and Outstanding Performance by an Auxiliary Percussionist.

Later in February, we held our second annual Jazz and Java concert here in our large gym, complete with delicious treats, beverages, and a silent auction. Our four jazz groups performed, and we welcomed guest adult band Vancouver Groove Orchestra. Our three concert bands took part in our Spring Concert at the school in early March and performed some of the music that they were preparing for their Spring trips.

In April, we went on our first international trip with our grade 10 - 12 Music students, travelling to Los Angeles and Anaheim for five days. Our Senior Concert Band and Senior Jazz Band performed at the Los Angeles Farmers' Market as well as in Disneyland. We also attended an instrumental soundtrack workshop in Disneyland where we were recorded playing along with clips to Disney movies. We enjoyed some time visiting Los Angeles, but we especially loved being in Disneyland, checking out the parks, watching performances, buying souvenirs, and riding as many rides as we could get on!

Also in April, 129 of our grade 8 and 9 Music students travelled to Whistler for three days to participate in the Cantando Music Festival. We had two concert bands and two jazz bands perform at the festival, and they all had very successful performances. Our Junior Jazz Band, Grade 9 Jazz Band, and Grade 9 Concert Band were awarded Honourable Mentions by the adjudicators for being some of the top ensembles at the festival!

In early May, the GH Junior Concert Band took part in the Surrey Grade 8 Concert Band Revue and were recognized by the adjudicator for their excellent performance by receiving an invitation to perform at MusicFest Canada! Throughout this Spring, our grade 9 - 12 students visited all five of our feeder elementary schools to perform for them, which has been a great opportunity to share our music with younger students.

Students are currently working hard to prepare for our third annual Year-End Concert on Thursday, June 13th at 7:00 pm in the school gym. We hope to see many community members in the audience that evening, as we celebrate our students' successes so far this year; please consider attending! Admission is by donation and tickets will be available at the door. Numerous door prizes will be available, and a 50/50 draw will take place. Some favourite assignments include the Basquiat piece, Animal Eye and Hidden World *value* study, digital character creation and Watercolour Neurographic portraits. Now, as the semester is nearing an end, students will be moving onto their final project where they will create their own original composition bringing the Elements of Art together in a unique way. We look forward to seeing what they create!

Look out for our IDS Exhibition, "Echoes of Self" in the Learning Commons this spring June 10-14th. The Independent Study in Visual Art or Ceramics is a course offered to highly engaged & motivated art students, in grade 11/12. Many are working on building their portfolios for international art schools (many of our students have continued their students in Architecture, Design, Illustration, Game Design, Animation & Visual Arts).



Grandview has a bright & creative future ahead.




