SCHOOL BUSING INFORMATION

The following communication is relayed from District Student Bus Services:

STUDENTS MUST RE-APPLY FOR BUSING PRIOR TO EACH NEW SCHOOL YEAR.

All students: Students who apply after the June 30 deadline are not guaranteed a seat on the bus. Eligible families can still apply for busing for any seats that may be remaining, however, applications submitted after the June 30 deadline will not be processed until the **beginning September 15** and may take up to 10 school days. There will not be any seats available for late Courtesy (fee paying) students. We advise filling out the <u>online registration form</u> as it is the quickest way to get your student on the registration list.

Families are responsible for transporting their student to and from school, and will need to make alternate transportation arrangements for their student until such time as a seat may be awarded.

Eligible students:

Bus service starts the second day of school and goes according to the pickup and drop off times indicated on the bus schedule. **LATE** Eligible student applications will be advised within ten (10) school days *after processing* if their student has been awarded a seat (processing begins September 15).

Courtesy students:

There may be a <u>very</u> limited number of seats available for purchase. Your student may have received a seat in previous years, but may not receive a seat for the current school year. Courtesy students are not guaranteed a seat on the bus since the number of eligible applications vary from year to year. Please ensure you have another source of transportation set up for your students in the event they are not awarded a seat. Only if buses are not at full capacity will there be extra seats available and offered to paying courtesy riders.

If there are seats remaining for Courtesy students that have applied by the June 30 deadline, Transportation will advise the school beginning October 1. (Actual date of registration submission has no bearing on Courtesy seat assignment as long as it meets the deadline. Courtesy students are seated using a complex set of criteria beginning with farthest distance from the school (in-catchment). If seats still remain the criteria broadens.)

The school will then contact the parent / guardian if a seat is available for your student - in which case the school will then collect payment before the student is awarded the seat. Courtesy families will be invoiced a prorated yearly fee of \$30 per full/partial month for the first student (\$15 for siblings) for the remainder of the 2025-26 school year. Once payment has been made a schedule and bus pass will then be provided. Alternatively, families will be contacted by Transportation directly beginning October 1st if there are no seats remaining for your student.

All students must have an authorized and stamped schedule for the 2025-26 school year in order to board the bus, until the printed pass card is received. Students without an authorized schedule will be refused to ride. Students will not be permitted to ride another bus route or board at times other than indicated on their schedule.




GRANDVIEW VISUAL ARTS



MEDICAL ALERTS

A Medical Alert condition is defined as a physician diagnosed, potentially life threatening condition such as:

- Diabetes.
- Epilepsy.
- Anaphylaxis

(history of a severe allergic response which requires planned support inside as well as outside the school environment).

- Severe Asthma
 - (history of episodes requiring immediate medical treatment or a history of requiring immediate medication).
- Blood clotting disorders such as hemophilia that require immediate medical care in the event of injury.
- Serious heart conditions.
- Other conditions which may require emergency care and/or the administration of medication as determined in consultation with parents/student/family physician, school and Medical Health Officer or designate.

PARKING / DROP-OFFS & PICK-UP INSTRUCTIONS


Grandview Heights Secondary Administration, staff and school PAC has worked together with the Surrey School District and City of Surrey to address some of the many traffic and safety concerns in and around our school property. I would like to thank our PACs transportation committee for their leadership and help with our work together. We have included a school traffic flow map and general updates to ensure student and staff safety remains a top priority during the morning drop off and afternoon pick up times. Please review the following information and be sure to adhere to all instructions included in this communication.

The major concerns are regarding the South-West Entrance way that runs along the West side of the Main office and in front of the Theatre. In particular, the congestion that is created when the Visitor Parking and the Accessible Parking spaces are used for the drop-off and pick-up of students is an issue that we would like to bring to everyone's attention. We ask that vehicles do not pull into, and then out of, the Staff & Student Parking Lot or any Accessible Parking spaces for the purpose of drop-offs or pick-ups.

Student Drop-Off and Pick-Up. For parents dropping off students at school, there are two laneways which run along the South side of the main classroom section of Grandview Heights. Vehicles will need to travel towards the far South-East part of the school property to enter these lanes and turn left to enter these lanes and head West through the laneways. The laneway furthest to the South has angled visitor parking spaces, while the laneway North of this is designed for vehicles to pull parallel to the curb to allow for exit and entrance to vehicles by students. **Please be aware that the doors on the East side of the building are available for students to enter the school through in the morning.**

Student Parking – Students parking vehicles on school property are required to park in the North-West section of the parking lot that sits to the West of the Tech-Ed Shops. A student parking pass may be obtained from the main office.

Please always drive carefully and slowly while on school property and do not enter or travel through the Bus Lane.



STUDENT BIKES, SCOOTERS & BOARDS

Students and Guardians. Please make sure you have the necessary equipment to secure your personal transportation devices to one of the provided parking racks surrounding the outside of the school. Scooters, Skateboards, Bikes and like devices will not be permitted to be stored in the school office or other general inside areas as this can create a safety hazard.
