Social Studies 9: S1 2025-2026: Course Outline

Course Overview

The world is becoming increasingly complex to navigate. More than ever, we have constant access to information that we need to learn to understand and analyze. Many things you see can be considered *misinformation* (false information with the intention to deceive).

Social Studies is about becoming more thoughtful and responsible. We learn to acquire information from multiple perspectives and make informed judgements about it. We learn about empathy to become better, more respectful citizens. During this course, we will learn about the various skills that can assist us in doing this.

This semester, we will examine the present and past to make connections, along with trying to make educated predictions for the future. This course specifically focuses on the period from 1750 to 1919. Here, the world saw many new ideas and ideologies, saw the negative impacts of imperialism and colonialism resulting in many revolutions, and saw the development of various collective identities. All of these affect our world today.

Course Objectives

The following are some of the skills we will develop over the course:

- Inquiry and Critical Thinking
 - Creating and researching questions related to historical and current events.
 - Evaluating how reliable primary and secondary sources are.
 - o Identifying different perspectives during research.
- Research Skills
 - Gathering information from various sources.
 - Analyzing information to draw informed conclusions.
- Communication Skills
 - Presenting information in oral, written, and visual formats.
 - Using evidence to support claims.
 - Collaborating with peers to discuss and come up with collective conclusions.
- Historical Thinking Skills
 - Recognizing continuity and change throughout history.
 - Understanding the causes and consequences of various events.
 - Evaluating the significance of key events and individuals.
