10 HABITS OF SUCCESSFUL STUDENTS

Get Organized. Making a plan for what you're going to do and when you're going to do it will make sure you're always ahead of the curve - literally.

Don't multitask. Studies have shown that multitasking is physically impossible.

Divide it up. Studying isn't fun to begin with, and forcing yourself through a study marathon will only make it worse. Dividing your work into manageable chunks and rewarding yourself when you finish each chunk will make studying (more) fun.

Sleep. Don't underestimate the importance of those eight hours of zzz's every night! Getting a good night's rest will sharpen your focus and improve your working memory.

Set a schedule. Do you work better right after school or after you've eaten dinner? Are you more productive in 90-minute blocks or half-hour spurts? Find a schedule that works for you, and stick to it.


Take notes. Taking notes will not only keep you more engaged during class, but will also help you narrow down what you need to study when exam time rolls around. It's much easier to reread your notes than to reread your entire textbook!


Study. This one might be obvious, but did you know that there's a right and a wrong way to study? Review your material several days ahead of time, in small chunks, and in different manners (for example, write flashcards one day and take practice tests the next). In other words, don't cram.

Manage your study space. Find a place that will maximize your productivity. Look for places away from the television and other distractions. Whether it's your local library or just the desk in your bedroom, set aside a study space that you'll want to spend time in.

Find a study group. Sitting down with a group of people who are learning the same things as you is a great way to go over confusing class material or prepare for a big test. You can quiz each other, reteach material, and make sure that everyone is on the same page. After all, teaching someone else is the best way to learn.

Ask questions. You're in school to learn, so don't be afraid to do just that! Dear Parents and Guardians:

Re: Community Youth Activities "Grad Pranks"

We share the pride of accomplishment and look forward to joining you in congratulating the class of 2020. However, in past years there have been troubling incidents of unsafe behaviour and acts of vandalism involving youth in our neighbourhoods participating in reckless events, often characterized as grad activities. Such events are a trend, not just in our school district but in other communities as well. We are asking for your help in ensuring your son or daughter is aware that unsafe and unacceptable behaviours can have serious consequences.

It is important that we work together to ensure that our young people do not take part in, condone, provoke, encourage, or support:

- bullying, cyberbullying, harassment, threat(s) or intimidation
- violence of any form
- verbal, physical or sexual abuse
- discrimination in any form
- theft
- unsafe or dangerous activities
- vandalism
- possession or use of intoxicating or banned substances
- possession or use of weapons (or replica weapons) and explosives

Youth involved in these types of activities may face criminal and school consequences, including losing the privilege to attend extra-curricular events such as the grad ceremony and banquet. Students may also face suspension from school and/or criminal charges. Given that positive citizenship is often considered in selection for school and district scholarships, poor decisions can also impact those award possibilities. Parents are also financially responsible for damage caused by their children – please see the attached School Act excerpt. We ask that you understand the school's and district's position in taking the necessary disciplinary steps in circumstances where inappropriate behaviour occurs.

We also fully support your decision to not permit your son or daughter to attend unsupervised

events. We often hear about camping trips, parties or trips to vacation spots like Whistler which are not organized by the district, parents or the school. Our shared goal of safety for all of our young people is compromised when these events occur. Please contact the school administration if you are uncertain about the status of an event. We would be happy to clarify if this is an event supported by the school or the district. Each year in B.C. there are tragic events associated with "grad activities" that could be avoided through increased awareness and clear expectations.

BC Ministry of Education Governance and Legislation Branch C-1 April 16, 2009 REVISED STATUTES OF BRITISH COLUMBIA, 1996

Division 3 - Joint Rights and Duties Liability for damage to property

Core Competencies

The Core Competencies are sets of intellectual, personal, and social and emotional proficiencies that all students need in order to engage in deep, lifelong learning. Along with literacy and numeracy foundations, they are central to British Columbia's K-12 curriculum and assessment system and directly support students in their growth as educated citizens.

Students develop Core Competencies when they are engaged in the "doing" – the Curricular Competencies – within a learning area. As such, they are an integral part of the curriculum. While they manifest themselves uniquely in each area of learning, the Core Competencies are often interconnected and are foundational to all learning.



Students, teachers, and parents/guardians share responsibility for the ongoing development of Core Competencies. Each group has its own considerations.

Before students enter school, development of Core Competencies begins at home and then continues throughout their life. Students encounter opportunities to develop their competence in formal and informal settings. They move from demonstrating competence in relatively simple and highly supported situations, to demonstrating independence in more complex and varied contexts. Competency development does not end with school graduation but continues in personal, social, educational, and workplace contexts.

This Core Competencies feature is from Mr. Drake's Youth in Trades 9/10 class. The particular assignment is to build a robot to be the champion on the race course. Speed is one factor but so are maneuverability and steering. As Adam explains "you can have the fastest robot but if it can turn or if you have a bad driver you may not win."

The students reflect on the information they receive through observation and the experience to solve problems, design, understand and address issues with their robots. As critical thinkers they use their ideas, experiences, and reflections to set goals, make judgements, and refine their thinking. Some reflections I heard while watching them race and during alterations:


"What if we make it longer?"

"Without the traction tire it doesn't go straight"

"We are spinning because one side is faster than the other!"

Embedded in the lesson are many of the Core Competencies most considerably (but not limited to); **Critical and Reflective Thinking** (analyzing and critiquing, questioning and investigating, designing and developing & reflecting and assessing), **Creative thinking** (creating and innovating, generating and incubating & evaluating and developing), **Collaborating** (working collectively, supporting group interactions, & determining common purposes), as well as **Communicating** (connecting and engaging with others, focusing on intent and purpose, & acquiring and presenting information).







The AP Lit 12 students happily and gratefully performed for six different classes this week during D-block and proudly displayed their talents before their parents on Thursday evening. They did not only delve deeply into the characters and themes in the classics: Charles Dickens' <u>A Christmas Carol</u> and Louisa May A lcott's <u>Little Women</u>, but they also shared the true "spirit of Christmas" that both Ebenezer Scrooge and Mrs. March were imparting.

So – from the AP Lit 12 class – a whole-hearted thank you!

DISTRICT PROGRAMS—DUAL CREDIT

There is space in the following District Programs:

Carpentry:

Job Description—Carpenters build and repair a vast array of structures made of wood, woodsubstitutes and other materials. Many work for construction companies, contractors and maintenance departments while others are self-employed. Carpenter is a nationally designated trade under the Inter-provincial Red Seal program. Carpenters assemble and erect forms for concrete, wood and metal frame construction and use plans and instruments to prepare for excavating and shoring. On smaller projects, they direct concrete placement, and install exterior and interior finish materials such as siding, doors, windows and cabinets.



Piping:

Job Description—These trades involve installing, altering and repairing the systems that keep our water and waste disposal systems running. They read and interpret blueprints and project specifications, as well as select the type and size of pipe required for a project and measure, shape and join pipes according to the appropriate specifications. After installation, they maintain pipes to prevent or repair leaks. These trade workers are often found in the construction industry, laying new pipe for buildings or doing extensive renovations to large buildings. They work with copper, steel, plastic, large cast iron and concrete pipes, and may have a familiarity with basic welding and electrical work and a limited amount of gas fitting work.






"NEW" DISTRICT PROGRAMS—DUAL CREDIT

The following programs are new this year:

Explorations in Aviation Careers:

Industry Description—Canada's rapidly expanding aviation and aerospace industries offer a wide range of career options and opportunities including jobs in aircraft design, systems engineering, testing, search and rescue, human factors, piloting, air traffic control, jet mechanics, computer systems, airport management, customer service, and much more. Explore a range of Aviation industry careers. Students complete three months of study at North Surrey Secondary, one month at BCIT's Aerospace Technology Campus, and a three week work experience placement with an aviation industry company.





Tah-tul-ut Indigenous Education Pathway— The Tah-tul-ut Education Pathway is designed to provide knowledge and skills for education assistants to work with children and adolescents who require assistance in the learning process. Participants will also spend time developing their understanding of what it means to be an Urban Indigenous person, and how their Aboriginal identity can help inform their practice, especially when working with Indigenous children and youth. At the conclusion of the Tah-tul-ut program, students may choose to go on to work as an EA, or to continue with their studies in the Bachelor of General Studies in Education Program (BGS) at SFU. Completion of the BGS Program will allow students to pursue entry into the Teacher Education Professional Development Program (PDP) at SFU.

Another interesting program:

Heavy Mechanical Trades Foundation:

Job Description—Heavy Mechanical Trades include work on: industrial and construction vehicles, such as mining trucks and bulldozers; heavy equipment used in construction, forestry, materials handling, landscaping, and land clearing. They overhaul, repair and service equipment such as graders, loaders, shovels, tractors, trucks, forklifts, drills, and wheeled and tracked vehicles. Working from manufacturers' specifications, they identify and repair problems in structural, mechanical, or hydraulic systems. Students in this program can continue technical training in the following areas:

- \Rightarrow Transport Trailer Technician
- \Rightarrow Truck and Transport Mechanic
- ⇒ Heavy Duty Equipment Technician
- \Rightarrow Diesel Engine Mechanic
