Grade 7 Farewell Assembly Awards – Awards Criteria

<u>Citizenship Award</u> - This recognizes the student who exemplifies honesty, works hard, shows respectful and fair practices, and is conscious of and shows consistent school-level involvement with world affairs. This student makes a difference and understands global awareness.

<u>Art Award</u> – This recognizes the student who is creative, original, and thoughtfully expresses ideas in a variety of media.

<u>Work Habits Award</u> – This is given to the student who uses good time management strategies, is organized, punctual, productive in class, and maximizes his or her potential with quality work. The person acknowledges, by actions, the importance of a learning environment for everyone.

<u>Most Improved Award</u> – This award recognizes the student who shows a movement forward from September to June with improved academics, work habits, organizational skills, effort, and attitude.

<u>Athletic Award</u> – This award recognizes the student who participates in school sports, models sportsmanship, provides team leadership, practices a healthy lifestyle, and displays humility.

<u>Academic Award</u> – This award is given to those students who consistently produce high quality work throughout the year. Assignments are always on time, and they are creative and show a depth of understanding with original thinking. In the final grade for the year, these students have exceeded expectations in the four core subjects of Language Arts, Math, Socials, and Science.

<u>Gauss Math Award</u> – This award is presented to the student who achieved the highest score in our Gauss Math Contest. The Gauss Math Contest is written nation-wide and is in partnership with the University of Waterloo. The contest tests students' mathematical problem-solving abilities and is based on common curriculum in Canadian provinces.

<u>21st Century Learner Award</u> – The recipient(s) of this award are creative and show a depth of understanding with original thinking, keeping the three core competencies (Communication, Thinking and Personal and Social Awareness) at the centre of their learning. These students have exceeded standards in most areas of learning. Recipients of this award are also "outside of the box" thinkers and represent their thinking in many ways.

<u>Cheryl Morgan All-Around Student Award</u> – This award honours the student who demonstrates positive character traits and practices strong values and beliefs. They must be strong leaders, respect other people, practice teamwork, and be responsible and accountable learners.

<u>Class Historians</u> – Two students, selected for their positive influence on others, revisit the years from Kindergarten to Grade 7, recognizing some memorable and humorous events and activities.

School Fees Notice to Parents/Guardians for 2018/2019

Each school year, parents support their child(ren)'s formal learning experiences in a wide variety of ways. We so appreciate all that you do to ensure a successful year!

In addition to providing the school supplies itemized on a grade list, parents are periodically asked for monies to cover specific items and/or special events. No student will be denied the opportunity to participate in any school activity due to financial difficulties. Please contact the Principal should you require any financial assistance.

As we plan for the upcoming school year, we anticipate the following costs:

Student Planner: We encourage all students in Grades 1-7 to purchase a School Planner at a cost of \$5.00. Included in the planner is our school code of conduct, school calendar and school district information. We find this to be an excellent tool for facilitating home/school communication, as well as for developing our students' organizational skills. However, using our school planner is optional as a parent may purchase their own version.

Field Studies and Field Trips: Classes often enjoy educational visits to community facilities which extend and enhance the curriculum. While we use school monies or fundraise to cover the costs of such activities wherever possible, there are times when parents are asked to contribute towards the cost of the trip. If you choose to have your child not participate in a field study, a suitable program will be provided at the school.

Musical Instruments: Grade 2 students may learn to play the recorder. Students will have the option of purchasing one through our music teacher for \$8.00 or receiving one on loan from the school. Students in Grade 4 may also play the recorder and can re-use their Grade 2 recorder, purchase a new one or receive one on loan from the school. Also, our Grade 7 students who opt for band either purchase or rent an instrument. Costs vary depending on the instrument.

School Supplies:

Parents have the option of purchasing their child's school supplies on their own, by utilizing the grade supply list available at the office, or for your convenience you may wish to purchase supplies as a package through Edu-Pac. These forms were sent out in May. Payment is made by cheque or credit card to Edu-Pac. Costs for supplies vary based on grade.

Kindergarten supplies will be done as a bulk order. Parents will be asked to contribute \$40.00 to cover those supplies. If you wish to opt out and purchase your own, please let the school know. Please note that all supplies in Kindergarten are shared by the whole group.
