Where to look for scholarships!?!

- Affiliation Scholarships
 - Talk to your family! Unions, employers, insurance companies, etc. often provide scholarships to employees or customers relatives.
 - Military connections, Cadets, Veteran's groups
 - Religious affiliations or cultural clubs
 - Extra-curriculars
 - Athletic organizations
 - Disabilities groups

Scholarship Profile – what to include

- Plans for Post-Secondary, schools, programs
- Transcript
- Work experience: company, dates, duties and responsibilities
- Volunteer experience: company, dates, duties and responsibilities
- School Involvement: clubs, committees, sports, etc.
- Awards, achievements, certifications
- Community Involvement: volunteering, sports, extra-curriculars, training
- Financial Information
- References
- Essays

Reference Letters

- Think about who could give you the best reference
 - Teacher, Counsellor, Coach, Employer, Religious leader, etc.
 - CANNOT be family member or friends
- Fill out the Reference Request Form (KP Career Centre Team) and give to whomever you ask
- Ask well in advance at least 2 weeks notice
- Ask for a general letter that you can use for multiple scholarships
- Make sure to write a thank you note for your references after your receive your letter

Essays

- Always read directions in full before starting
- Make sure to follow specific criteria (word count, bullets, etc.)
- Make sure your essays are personal and reflect you
- Be concise, use examples, often have limited words/space
- Proof read and edit
- Many scholarships applications have common themes. Save all essay entries so you can revise and reuse.

Common Essay Topics

- Overcoming challenges
 - What was the challenge, how did you overcome it and what did you learn from it?
- Leadership
 - Discuss a time when you were in a leadership role. Leadership comes in many forms.
 - Any act of responsibility and/or initiative that serves others is a form of leadership.
 - Just being on a team is not leadership it's about you stepping up and serving or helping others in some way.
- Volunteering or Community Involvement
- Future Plans
 - Discuss the program that you are applying for, how/why did you choose it, the potential career you want to pursue and why you think you'll be successful.

Final Thoughts

- Treat applying for scholarships like a part-time job. Putting aside time each week or month to work on scholarships will increase your chances of winning.
- Don't just apply for the big ones there are hundreds of scholarships out there, many are not advertised well which means there will be fewer applicants. Winning a couple hundred/thousand dollar scholarships is still a great return on your investment of time.
- Scholarships beget scholarships if you win once, you are more likely to win again. Receiving a scholarship increases confidence and can motivate you to apply for more. Also looks great on applications, resumes, etc. and can open up more opportunities.
