Students' digital portfolios went live on October 12th for parents to view and comment. Some ways you can effectively support your child's learning is to assist in their reflection process. There are three steps to reflect: Now,

Not Yet, Next. When viewing portfolios, use these as guiding questions.

Now – What did you learn, try to learn, do, succeed at, are proud of, want to celebrate? What I did and want you to notice and why, what I learned, what I tried to learn, what I am proud of, my strengths and the positives about this documentation. How and why do you know and feel this?

Not Yet (but that's okay)- What do you still need to work on, struggled with, were challenged by? What I need to work on, what was challenging, what I didn't do, what I need to still figure out and learn? How and why do you know and feel this?

Next – What do you need to do next to improve on, get better at, continue learning, and what will you do to get there? What help or support will you need? How I will learn more, get better, what strategies I will use, what help will I ask for? How and why do you know and feel this?



Halloween "Trick or Treat" Safety Tips

Have a fun and safe Halloween!

Costume safety

- Make sure that drivers can see your child. Use costumes with reflective tape and give each child a flashlight. Carry a glow stick that can be worn around the neck or wrist.
- Make sure your child can see. Use face paint instead of masks.
- To prevent falling, costumes should not be longer than your child's ankle.

Trick or treating safety

- Walk in groups and stay together. Visit houses on one side of the street at a time.
- Cross only at an intersection or at a marked crosswalk.
- Never walk out between cars to cross the street and never cross in the middle of the block.
- Children should stay in populated and well-lit areas and only visit homes that have their outside lights turned on. Children should never go inside any house.
- · Carry a cell phone in case of emergencies.
- Examine your children's candy before they eat it. Throw out any treats that are not wrapped.



Driving safety

- If you are driving on Halloween night, be extra ca reful. Slow down and look ahead. Be aware
 of your surroundings. Children are excited on Halloween and may forg et some of the safety
 rules.
- · Pay more attention to intersections and crosswalks.
- Be prepared to stop for kids who may run out in fr ont of you.
- Remember that there will be more foot traffic on Halloween night and most of it will be excited young children.
- If you are going to be attending an office party or an adult Halloween celebration, don't drive if
 you have been drinking.

An adult should always supervise younger children.
