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From The Library:

Dear White Rock Elementary Community Members,

It is my pleasure and privilege to serve as your teacher-librarian at White Rock Elementary.

Last year I began a program intended to help the children to keep track of library sign-outs and protect books from damage in backpacks and from the weather. Students were also able to easily view what materials were signed out in their names, which life skill I encouraged.

Last year, due to the kindness of a donor, we were able to provide each student with extra-large plastic Ziploc bags to which I affixed each individual student's bar code for sign-outs. Some students may still have these and, if in good condition, these bar-coded bags may still be used.

I received positive comments throughout the year and heard many stories of books that had been saved from exploding liquids in backpacks. Books were found in the gym/around the building and even outside, and it was clear whose they were. Having the books in plastic bags allowed us to keep much loved books as part of the library collection and also saved some families from the stress of paying for badly damaged books.

I would like to continue this initiative of protecting library books and encouraging students to keep track of what is signed out in their names. However, for this to happen, I need students to bring strong plastic bags that are large enough to hold large picture books and large non-fiction books.

Suitable bags are extra-large sized 13" wide x 14.75" (33 cm x 38.1 cm) or big bags 15" x 15" (38.1 cm x 38.1 cm).

Thank you so much for helping with this and supplying bags for your child/children.

I look forward to sharing some wonderful books with your children this year.

Fire Prevention Week

This Fire Prevention Week, October 7 to 13, 2018, your local fire department and your child's school have teamed up for safety! Your child has been learning about home fire escape planning, working smoke alarms, fire and burn hazards and ways to prevent home fires.

The theme this year is "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere".

"LOOK" for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home. Identify potential fire hazards and take care of them.

"LISTEN" for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Go to your outside meeting place, which should be a safe distance from the home and where everyone should know to meet.

"LEARN" two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

Please spend some time with your child to review the "Fire Safety Starts with You" activity booklet they brought home from school.

Home Fire Escape Plans

- Create a home fire escape plan showing two ways out of every room. Practise your plan with your entire family by having a home fire drill at least twice a year.
- Choose a meeting place a safe distance away from your home. All household members should be taught to report to the meeting place after leaving the home.
- One person should then go to a neighbour's house or the nearest phone in a safe location to contact 9-1-1 or your local emergency number.

Smoke Alarms

- Make sure everyone in your home can recognise the sound of the smoke alarm and knows exactly what to do when it sounds.
- Install working smoke alarms near sleeping areas and on every level of your home. Smoke alarms should be tested once a month by pushing the test button and listening for the alarm.
- For battery operated smoke alarms, replace batteries at least once a year. Batteries should also be replaced when the smoke alarm makes a chirping sound.
- Smoke alarms should be cleaned at least every 6 months by gently vacuuming the exterior.
- Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years.
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.
