Studies have shown significant reductions in school suspensions, more positive classroom environments, and better academic scores, among other benefits.

Highlighting examples from this rapidly growing movement across North America and beyond, this District-wide professional learning opportunity will provide an overview of restorative approaches in schools and lay out a strategy for implementation which promotes effective 'whole school' methodologies.

He brings international experience facilitating restorative justice processes, including within New Zealand's pioneering youth justice system and the United States judicial system. Aaron has delivered training in restorative approaches within criminal justice and educational settings in across British Columbia, Canada, and internationally including the United States, Bermuda, Brazil and Hong Kong. A former youth-worker and outdoor leadership instructor, Aaron also brings extensive facilitation experience leading arts-based dialogue programs among students involved in international political conflict.
