We ask that you make a designated "homework area" and "homework time" for your son/daughter. Children thrive on consistency of expectations. At times I believe we lose sight of what is important and let involvement in "activities" take precedence over homework. This can send the message that academic pursuits are not of value. There will be many times when no homework is assigned. I would like to suggest that students use this time for silent reading or "family reading" time for younger children. As adults, it is important that we MODEL the behaviours we want to encourage.

I am sure you are all anxious to meet the teachers and our opportunity will come soon! October 9 is our Family BBQ and Meet and Greet event. As mentioned in the brief letter I sent home on the first day, forms will be coming home next week for you to put your orders in for dinner. The event will run from 4:30 -6:30 pm.

Water Bottles

This year we are trying to make the most of our instructional time and minimize class disruptions. School Zone Safety Notice

For the safety of all school children and their parents, we are conducting scheduled educational and enforcement patrols at all Surrey Elementary Schools.

Please consider the safety of everyone's children, not just your own, when visiting your schools.

The simple courtesy of respecting the posted signage and directions from the Commissionaires and volunteers will reduce unnecessary accidents.

Your understanding and compliance with the rules will also re-enforce the benefits of safety before convenience to your children and other parents.



A General Guide to School Traffic Safety

There are over 150 schools in the City of Surrey, with each one generating high volumes of pedestrians, cyclists, and vehicles each morning and afternoon. A key objective of the City's Transportation Strategic Plan is to improve community safety, health and quality of life—all of which can be affected by the activities associated with trips to and from school.

School traffic safety is influenced by many things which can either minimize or exacerbate congestion during the peak pick-up and drop-off periods. The decision to walk, cycle or drive to school can be influenced by many factors, including the amount of traffic in the area, the width of roads, the provision of sidewalks, the types of pedestrian crossings, the amount of street parking available, the provision and type of bike parking facilities, and the on-site pick-up/drop-off facilities. Education of parents and students raises safety awareness and influences better choices and behaviours during school travel, and quite often enforcement is also required to encourage these proper choices. The three E's of safety—engineering, education, and enforcement—require the combined efforts and cooperation of parents, students, schools, the school district, the City, and the RCMP.

How can I help improve safety around schools?

The City's Safe and Active Schools Program is aimed at enhancing safety around schools by improving signage, implementing new road crossings, and constructing traffic calming measures and sidewalks, as well as working directly with schools to encourage more walking and cycling to school. We are doing many projects, but we need your support to maximize their benefit. Activities that you can do to help improve safety include:

- Encourage students to walk or cycle to school, or get picked up or dropped off a short distance away from school.
- Create walking groups of several families, in which parents alternate the responsibility of walking the children to school.
- Determine and discuss the safest route to walk or bicycle.
- Wear brightly coloured clothing to be visible to drivers.
- Observe proper practice when crossing streets.
- Obey the "No Stopping", "No Parking", and "Drop-off & Pick-up Only" signage.
- Respect the School Areas and Reduced Speed School Zones.
- Be alert and yield the right-of-way to pedestrians at all intersections and crosswalks.

Did you know?

School Areas and Zones

School Areas and Reduced Speed School Zones are considered for streets adjacent to school properties. School areas start as you pass a school area sign prior to the school property and end as you pass the back of the school area sign facing the opposite direction. Drivers should expect higher student pedestrian volumes and congestion within the school area, and should be alert for these potential conflicts and adjust their speed as required, even outside of school arrival and dismissal times.

Reduced speed (30 km/h) school zones are commonly used adjacent to elementary schools and are identified with a black and white speed tab placed under the school area sign. A reduced speed zone is in effect from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on school days. Travelling at the reduced speed allows the driver to stop quicker for unexpected occurrences that may happen adjacent to the school.
