Here are a few friendly hints to help parents survive students entering grade 8:

- Be involved in your child's academic program of study Make sure that your child is challenged and taking courses today that will help meet future goals.
- Get your child involved in a positive activity...but don't overextend Research says that students who are involved in an activity, club, sport, music, etc., are much more likely to have a positive high school experience and get better grades than students who are not involved.
- Know your child's friends Research says that when a teenager is faced with a critical decision, the influence of peers (positive and negative) and parents/families make the difference.
- Attend school night events.
- Do not allow your child to get lost in the shuffle In a large school, a student can feel lost. Research says that when a student makes positive connections with adults (teachers, counsellors, and coaches) it stops this from happening.
- Remember that all teenagers (including straight-A students) need proper supervision This supervision includes online supervision and supervision of technology. Remember, good kids make mistakes too. Your child should always know that you love him/her, but make sure he/she knows your expectations. Know where your child is and who they are with all the time.
- Get to know your child's teachers and counselor Stay in positive contact with the teachers and do not be afraid to ask for help. Remember that e-mail is a great tool for quick information, but it is not such a great tool for dealing with difficult issues.
- Get involved in school yourself The most successful students I have seen are the ones whose parents are involved. In a sense, these parents are the ones who are aware, and they use this information to support their children and the school.

PAC (Parent Advisory Council) has started and held their first meeting Sept 11th. Their next meeting is October 2nd at 7 pm in the library. PAC is a great place to get involved and find out what is happening in our school. New parents are always welcome.

Back to School 2019

Dear parents and guardians of B.C. students:

Welcome to the new school year – I hope you enjoyed a safe and restful summer. Whether your child is entering Kindergarten or nearing graduation, it's a great time to be a student in B.C.'s education system.

New this year, all students in the province will be learning from B.C.'s new curriculum and working towards completing the new Graduation Program and assessments, with the K-12 curriculum redesign process now complete. First Nations partners have helped us ensure the new curriculum accurately and fairly reflects the rich history of Indigenous Peoples in B.C., across all grades and subjects.

Parents know better than anyone that kids today are facing challenges we never imagined when it comes to social media, mental health and other challenges. All students deserve the best educational experience possible in healthy, positive and safe schools. We've expanded the ERASE (Expect Respect and a Safe Education) strategy to focus on mental health and wellness, substance use, social media safety, gang prevention and supporting students of all sexual orientations and gender identities.

All students in B.C. will have access to free menstrual products in school washrooms this year – ensuring stigma free access so that students don't miss school, extracurricular, sports or social activities because they can't afford menstrual products.

Students are returning to an education system that has more resources than ever before. Our government is investing \$1 billion more in education than just three years ago. They will attend some of the smallest classes in a generation, with more educators and others supports in the classroom. And we've invested over \$1.5 billion in new schools, expansions and seismic upgrades to ensure our kids are learning in safe, modern and comfortable schools.

Students in B.C. public schools are achieving world-class student outcomes, consistently ranking among the top in international assessments, and outcomes for Indigenous students and students with special needs are continuing to improve. Earlier this year, delegates from 40 countries visited B.C. to find out more about what we're doing right. We know there is always room to improve, and we are working hard every day to better support student success.




