# **SCHOOL BASED SAFETY MEASURES**

- Stay at home when sick (all students and staff with common cold, influenza, COVID-19, or other respiratory diseases must stay home and self-isolate).
- Conduct a daily health check prior to arriving at school/work.
- Perform diligent hand hygiene (thorough hand washing with plain soap and water for at least 20 seconds is the most effective way to reduce the spread of illness).
- Practice respiratory and personal hygiene (cover your coughs; do not touch your face; no sharing of food, drinks, or personal items).
- Physical distancing and minimizing physical contact (spread students and staff out to different areas when
  possible; learning groups (cohorts); take students outside more often; incorporate individual activities;
  remind students to keep their hands to themselves).
- Cleaning and disinfecting (clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at least twice every 24 hours (once during the school day); general cleaning of the school will occur at least once a day; Clorox 360 electrostatic sprayer will be used once per day in the evening).
- Parents and visitors will not be permitted within the school building unless previously arranged with the Principal (includes pick up and drop off of students and lunch).
- Families are asked to refrain from bringing anything to share with the class (homemade or purchased).
- No gatherings of more than 50 students and/or staff.

Also, every staff member and child will receive two masks. Elementary school students <u>are not</u> required to wear masks. Non-medical masks will be required to be used by adults in situations where a person cannot maintain physical distance and is in close proximity to a person outside of their learning group or household. Wearing a non-medical mask, face covering, or face shield in schools outside of these circumstances is a personal choice and will be respected. However, if a student or staff member develops symptoms, while at school, they <u>must</u> wear a mask while they are preparing to go home. Exceptions will be made for staff and students who cannot wear masks for medical reasons.

# FIRST WEEK OF SCHOOL

Students in <u>Kindergarten</u>, who are attending <u>full-time face-to-face</u>, will attend an orientation for one hour with half of the Kindergarten students attending on Thursday, September 10<sup>th</sup> and half attending on Friday, September 11<sup>th</sup>. <u>An email will be sent to all Kindergarten parents indicating which day to attend</u>. Kindergarten students will meet on our basketball court on their assigned date. Staff will be on hand to direct students and ensure physical distancing. Please maintain 2m distance from others.

Kindergarten students will receive information about their Gradual Entry schedule in a separate email.

Students in **grades 1 – 7**, who are attending **full-time face-to-face**, will attend an orientation for one hour on both Thursday, September 10<sup>th</sup> **and** Friday, September 11<sup>th</sup>. All students will meet on the gravel field. There will be signs set up indicating where each grade will meet and staff will be on hand to direct students and ensure physical distancing. Please maintain 2m distance from others.



# STUDENT ABSENCES AND LATE ARRIVALS

# **LUNCH TIME**

#### Parent Permission to Leave the School

- Please inform the office if your child is going home for lunch with an adult.
- If your child will be going home for lunch every day, please email the office to request a *Lunch Permission Form*. The form must be returned to the school so we have a list of all students who will be leaving the school grounds during lunch.
- If a student is going home occasionally, a written parental permission note/letter must be sent to school for that specific day.

# **Lunch Drop Offs**

Please send lunch with your child each morning. We will not be having lunch drop offs this year.

#### TRAFFIC SAFETY



- All children are encouraged to walk to school, whenever possible, with friends, older siblings and/or an adult family member. This relieves traffic congestion and establishes a safer environment for everyone.
- Use the crosswalks provided.
- Only park in the designated areas of the parent parking lot.
- If you must drive, please remember:
  - o seat belt and booster seat legislation protects children from serious injuries;
  - o do not make u-turns or back up in school zones;
  - o pull into a parking stall at the front of the school when dropping off children;
  - NO DROP OFFS IN STAFF PARKING LOT and refrain from walking through the staff parking lot – there is too great a risk of student injury;
  - o the speed limit in the school zone is 30 km/h between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.; and
  - adult modelling of traffic safety is the most powerful way to ensure that your children are safe!

#### OPTIONAL STUDENT ACCIDENT INSURANCE

Did you know our School District does not provide accident insurance coverage for student injuries that occur on school property or during school activities including extracurricular sports? If a student is injured, as parents and guardians you are responsible for any costs not covered by the MSP Health Plan or your employers benefit plan.

It's important to know that most accident-related expenses are not fully covered under the MSP and some expenses like ambulance fees, casts, crutches, physiotherapy, and emergency dental care are usually not covered at all.

Your DPAC and the School District provides the opportunity to voluntarily purchase private accident insurance through the Insure my Kids Accident Insurance program underwritten by Old Republic Insurance Company of Canada.

#### Plan features:

- Provides coverage 365 days a year, 24 hours a day, in or out of school.
- Covers expenses that are limited or not insured under MSP, private or group insurance plans; for example, ambulance fees, hospital room expenses, private tutors, counselling and much more.
- Critical Illness expenses related to a new diagnosis of specific Critical Illnesses such as Cancer,
   Cardiomyopathy, Necrotizing Fasciitis just to name a few. Full plan details on website.
- Dental expenses includes 10 years unlimited dental benefit coverage, future dental and injury related orthodontia coverage.
- Covers injury related Eyeglasses (repair or replace up to \$300).
- Low annual premiums from \$17 per student for the Silver Plan.
