Parents and students are advised of the following general fees and workbook pricing for the 2021/2022 school year. The school will provide the essential materials and resources necessary for students to meet the learning outcomes for each course. Students will need to continue to provide their own basic supplies and equipment for their own personal use such as paper, writing tools, calculators, notebooks, gym attire and musical instruments. Career Life Connections 12

Career Life Connections 12 is a BC Ministry of Education required course for high school graduation. The aim of Career Life Education 12 is to prepare students to learn how to effectively manage their life journey toward preferred future possibilities, and to help students develop the confidence, knowledge, and competencies necessary to succeed in an ever-changing world. This course is taken in Gr. 11.

The Capstone Project

A Capstone project is a celebration of learning and experience. The purpose of the capstone is to let students demonstrate the knowledge, competencies and passion(s) that they can offer the world, as they integrate personal interests, strengths, and new learning with preferred future possibilities. It is designed to encourage students to think critically, solve challenging problems and develop skill sets. Students will use innovation, cross curricular knowledge, and critical thinking skills in an area of interest as the basis for the project, which is applicable to real-world concepts.

The Capstone Project is also a BC Ministry of Education required component for high school graduation. This project is completed through the Career Life Connections 12 course.

Capstone presentations will occur:

- For Semester 1 CLC students on January 12 ad 13, 2022
- For Semester 2 CLC students on June 1 and 2, 2022



CLE-CAREER LIFE EDUCATION 10



CAREER LIFE EDUCATION 10 COURSE OUTLINE

What is Career Life Education 10?

- Career Life Education 10 (CLE 10) is a required course for students in BC and is mandatory for high school graduation.
- The aim of Career Life Education 10 is to enable students to develop the skills they need to become self-directed individuals who set goals, make thoughtful decisions, and take responsibility for pursuing their goals during and after high school.



How does it work?

- CLE 10 is a non-enrolling course at Kwantlen Park that occurs outside of the timetable.
- This means that students will view lessons and presentations and complete a variety of activities, reflections, or assignments on their own time.
- CLE 10 will be online and use both Microsoft Teams and myBlueprint.ca
- Each activity will build off of the previous one with the goal to help prepare students for Career Life Connections in grade 11, as well as provide students opportunities to develop important life skills such as creating a resume and exploring post-secondary options.

When will CLE 10 run?

- This course will start November 2021 and run through until the end of May 2022.
- There will be 5 Units with various activities and a summative assignment for each unit.
- Students will cover approx. 1 unit every 4-5 weeks.

How will students be assessed?

- Each of the 5 summative assignments will be worth 20% of the overall course mark.
- Students will be assessed through their participation as evidenced through their reflections and completed assignments.
- Rubrics will be provided for each assignment so students will know ahead of time what competencies or content they will be assessed on.

What if I need help?

- If at anytime students have questions about the activities and assignments or need help with navigating Teams or myBlueprint, they can either drop in to the Career Centre and see us in person, or contact us via Teams Chat or email.
- If you don't have internet access at home, you are welcome to use the computers in the career centre any time between 8AM and 4PM, Monday Friday.
- There will be monthly optional sessions for students to check in and get in person help at lunch time.
