

Social Studies 9- Course Outline

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Course Description

History matters. You can only understand the world around you if you understand the past that helped create it. You might have heard the phrase "History repeats itself." As typical human beings, we tend to repeat behaviour and actions, which we see as patterns in history. To be able to make sense of the world today, you need to piece together the whole story that led us to this place.

Big Ideas for the Year

- Make ethical judgments about past events, decisions, or actions, and assess the limitations of drawing direct lessons from the past **(ethical judgment)**

Grades

Formative assessment (teacher, self + peer assessment) includes offering you various feedback from me to learn from your “mistakes”; to improve your skills and knowledge through practice. You will also be encouraged to work with others (pairs and small groups) to receive feedback through self-assessment and peer-assessment with the aim of improving your skills and knowledge. Note: not all tasks/assignments will be included in your formative assessment.

Summative assessment (teacher + self-assessment) includes an assessment of the critical skills and knowledge you have been working on gaining throughout our course, it is a snapshot of learning. Your assessment/proficiency in this academic course will reflect your course work that tests and projects.

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Attendance/ Late Policy

Late Assignment Policy

In order to keep up with the pace of curriculum requirements, allow adequate opportunity for issuing feedback, and meet grade-reporting deadlines, it is expected that assignments be submitted on the due date. If a student is unable to submit an assignment on the due date, it is the student's responsibility to communicate with the teacher to receive an alternative date beforehand. In addition to this, it is the student's responsibility to come and find any missed work if absent. If a student is unable to complete the outstanding assignment by the time it is graded and returned to the rest of the class, it will no longer be accepted. An alternative assignment will be issued at the convenience of the teacher. Note that: All late assignments, with the exception of those that have valid reasons such as doctor's notes proving illness or injury, bereavement, family emergencies, and such other urgent or medical matters will not receive any feedback or opportunity to revise/resubmit and will be marked at the convenience of the teacher. If you are frequently handing in assignments late or are missing work, you will be required to stay in at lunch or after school to finish your assignments. This will be at the teacher's convenience and not yours!

Classroom Policies and Expectations
