These awards offer an opportunity to honour and uplift Indigenous youth athletes (First Nations, Métis, and/or Inuit) who reside in B.C., are under the age of 25 (born in 1997 or earlier), have achieved excellence in performance sport, and have demonstrated their leadership qualities both on and off the field of play.

The National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation is inviting youth across the country to *Imagine a Canada* through the lens of Reconciliation. Youth from Kindergarten to Grade 12 and CÉGEP can participate by submitting artwork, videos, songs, plans for community events, gatherings, workshops, permanent installations — the sky's the limit.

12 pieces of art (by K-G5 youth) will be selected and featured in a special art book and 15 projects (by G6-12 & CÉGEP youth) will receive up to \$1500 in grant funding to make the projects happen.

In this 48-minute video, **Murray Sinclair**, former senator and former chair of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, talks to CBC Radio's <u>Unreserved</u> about the September 30 National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. On its eve, Sinclair shares his belief that reconciliation will not be achieved in his lifetime, but states, "if we make a concerted effort ... then eventually we will be able, someday, to wake up and, to our surprise, find that we are treating each other in a

"The Road to Reconciliation," features Bob Joseph and Maurice Stizer as they reflect on whether Canada has finally reached a moment of national reckoning following the discovery of 200 children in unmarked graves at the former Kamloops Indian Residential School.
