

Children and masks: How to safely use a mask in school

Thursday, April 1, 2021

Following Fraser Health's <u>recent mandate requiring Grade 4 to 12 students to wear non-medical masks indoors</u>, the district would like to highlight mask safety among children and address any related health and safety concerns.

Experts agree that wearing a mask is an effective way to protect yourself and others against the coronavirus. It prevents the spread of droplets from a person's mouth and nose when talking, laughing, yelling, singing, coughing or sneezing.

According to the BCCDC, <u>masks are considered safe for children two or older</u>, provided they are worn properly and handled correctly.



Masks should:

- O Cover the mouth and nose completely and go under the chin
- O Fit tightly with no gaps (consider adjustable masks)
- O Be made of three layers of fabric, including two layers of tightly woven fabric, with a filter or filter fabric between layers
- O If there are two layers with a pocket for a filter, use a filter

Young children may find masks irritating and inadvertently touch their face and eyes more. The health order does not require kindergarten to Grade 3 students to wear masks, though they are encouraged to do so if they would like to, in line with the Gr. 4-12 requirements.

To ensure the effectiveness of your mask, remember to bring at least one clean mask to school every day. Try not to touch it while you're wearing it. Replace your mask if it gets wet or soiled during the day if you have a spare one.

It's important to remember that even when wearing a mask, you need to continue to wash your hands, keep your distance from others and stay home when sick.

For cloth masks, hand or machine wash after each use using the directions on the original material, preferably with hot or warm water, and allow the mask to dry completely before use. Replace the mask if it tears, as any damage or breakdown to the fabric or change in fit will reduce the protection of cloth masks.

Health and Safety:

School Exposure Notifications



The timing of each step may vary. This can be due to differences in the time it takes someone to develop symptoms after exposure, when someone gets tested, the number of cases being managed by public health, and the information available to public health through contact tracing.









Day 0

Nancy unknowingly exposed to COVID-19 outside of school.

Day 3

Nancy feels fine and has no symptoms. She attends school but may be able to spread COVID-19 to others.

Day 4

Day 5

Nancy develops symptoms and stays home.

Day 6

Nancy takes a symptom self-assessment and gets a COVID-19 test.







Days 7+

Health authority is notified of Nancy's positive test result and contacts her. Health authority interviews Nancy.

They discover Nancy may have been able to spread COVID-19 at school.

Health authority contact traces to find out who Nancy's close contacts are at school.





Days 7+

Health authority notifies Nancy's close contacts by phone or letter. Close contacts will need to self-isolate. Other contacts may be asked to monitor for symptoms. The school district is notified.

Notification posted on health

authority website. Extra notification
may go out to the school community.

1. STAY HOME WHEN SICK

All children and staff with common cold, influenza, COVID-19, or other respiratory diseases must stay home and self-isolate.



4. PHYSICAL DISTANCING AND MINIMIZING PHYSICAL CONTACT

Spread children out to different areas.

Take them outside more often.

Stagger lunch times. Incorporate individual activities.

Remind children, "Hands to Yourself!".



2. HAND HYGIENE

Everyone should wash their hands more often!

Thorough hand washing with plain soap and water for at least 20 seconds is the most effective way to reduce the spread of illness.



5. CLEANING AND DISINFECTION

Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at least twice a day.

General cleaning of the centre should occur at least once a day.

Use common cleaning and disinfectant products.



3. RESPIRATORY AND PERSONAL HYGIENE

Cover your coughs.

Do not touch your face.

No sharing of food, drinks, or personal items.

*Check BCCDC's Symptoms of COVID-19 regularly to ensure the list is up to date.

If you answered "YES" to one of the questions included under 'Key Symptoms of Illness' (excluding fever), you should stay home for 24 hours from when the symptom started. If the symptom improves, you may return to theschool/district site when you feel well enough. If the symptom persists or worsens, seek a health assessment.

If you answered "YES" to two or more of the questions included under 'Symptoms of Illness' or you have a fever, seek a health assessment. A health assessment includes calling 8-1-1, or a primary care provider like a physician or nurse practitioner. If a health assessment is required, you should not return to the school/district site until COVID-19 has been excluded and your symptoms have improved.

When a COVID-19 test is recommended by the health assessment:

- If the COVID-19 test is positive, you should stay home until you are told by public health to end selfisolation. In most cases this is 10 days after the onset of symptoms. Public health will contact everyone with a positive test.
- If the COVID-19 test is negative, you can return to the school/district site once symptoms have improved and you feel
 well enough. Symptoms of common respiratory illnesses can persist for a week or more. Re-testing is not needed unless
 you develop a new illness.
- If a COVID-19 test is recommended but is not done because you choose not to have the test, or you donot seek a
 health assessment when recommended, and your symptoms are not related to a previously diagnosed health
 condition, you should stay home from the school/district site until 10 days after the onset of symptoms, and then you
 may return if you are feeling well enough.

If a COVID-19 test is not recommended by the health assessment, you can return to the school/district site when symptoms improve and you feel well enough. Testing may not be recommended if the assessment determines that the symptoms are due to another cause (i.e. not COVID-19).

If you answered "YES" to questions 2 or 3, use the <u>COVID-19 Self-Assessment Tool</u> to determine if you should seektesting for COVID-19

A health-care provider note (i.e. a doctor's note) should not be required to confirm the health status of any individual.

"This Week at Fleetwood Park" - Principal's Message: April 6th - April 9th

Good morning and happy Thursday everyone. I hope you all enjoyed a restful, quiet and safe Easter long weekend and returned to school this week with focus and good health! At Fleetwood Park Secondary we have been busy with the completion of curriculum and final assessment of our 3rd Quarter courses. We have also been very busy with timetable building, staffing, and planning for next year. As always, this is a very eventful time of the year.

We returned to school on Tuesday morning with a full week ahead of us. We started the Provincial Learning Survey for all Grade 10 students on Tuesday morning. This year students were required to complete the survey within their cohorts and using their own devices in order to ensure Covid safety protocols were maintained. Great thanks to students/staff for your participation in this annual Ministry of Education survey. The results help to inform us of both strengths and areas of challenge within the school. We use this information in our planning processes and it is a valuable opportunity for community feedback. Please note that this survey is open to students, parents and staff. If there are any students who missed the opportunity to complete the survey in their Block A class this week, you are encouraged to go to the Provincial Learning Survey website, take about 20 minutes, and complete the questionnaire.

Also on Tuesday, Staff Committee met to review Round 1 postings for the 21-22 school year. We will be hoping to fill 3 positions; and believe there will be a few more positions over rounds 2 and 3. Again, our timetabling and staffing process is a complex and lengthy project. We will be sending out the draft timetable to Department Heads this week... and appreciate your feedback as we fine tune our structures over the months ahead.





The Dry Grad Committee also met on Tuesday evening. This industrious, committed group of parent volunteers has been working behind the scenes for months as they raise funds and try to plan for Dry Grad 2021. Due to the pandemic, and the everchanging nature of public health and educational safety guidelines, planning for this event has been very challenging. Thank you to all parent volunteers for all of your efforts. This weekend the Dry Grad Committee will again be hosting a COVID-safe clothing and bottle drive at the school. Please see details in this newsletter. We are hopeful that this will be a successful fundraiser.

On Wednesday, we continued with the Provincial Learning Survey with our Grade 12 classes. Again, all students that missed writing the survey in block A are encouraged to complete the survey at home!

On a completely different note, we have also been focussed on a couple of large "facility" projects this week. On Wednesday, I toured the school with the project manager of our "New Flooring" project. This summer, new flooring will be installed in many rooms across our school. We will be very busy in the last week of June boxing up our supplies. In July and August the old flooring will be removed and new carpet/lino will be installed. Big project... but will be much appreciated when complete when we return in September. Also on Wednesday, our "New Telephone" project was installed. This has also been a significant and complex operation, with many technical details and requirements.

The highlight of my week was my visit to Mr. Sutton's Engineering 9 class. Students were completing 3D models of their self-designed homes. They were developing powerful and highly relevant technical skills while having fun learning! I was amazed at the creativity of the students and their skills in manipulating the Design software. Way to go Dragons!







We returned to school on Thursday morning to new telephones and automated systems. Our staff will be working through the new functionality over the days ahead, and our technical crew will be working through the expected necessary "fixes". Callers to the school will hear a new automated system to help direct your calls. As we go through this implementation dip, I thank everyone in advance for your patience and understanding as we get up to speed with our new system.

On Thursday morning, the Admin team attended a virtual District meeting to discuss the latest District Covid-19 Safety guidelines and initial planning for next year's timetable. The District will be establishing Universal, Targeted and Intensive layers of protocol based upon the exposure levels experienced within particular schools. Currently, at Fleetwood Park, we are at the Universal level. We will continue to place the health and safety of our students and staff as our 1st priority, we will continue to implement all safety protocols, and we will continue to monitor all systems and interactions for ongoing adjustments and protection. With this, just a few reminders regarding recent safety guideline announcements. Please note that the District and Province enacted new expectations for mask wearing for all grade 4-12 staff. We again ask that all Dragons wear a mask throughout the day; except when you are eating (while physically distanced). Also, all parents, friends of the school are reminded that visitors to the school are not permitted, unless previously approved through the principal. Thank you for your help in keeping our Dragons safe!

This Friday, will be our first online Grade 7 parent/guardian "Tea and Tour". This will be a small, informal virtual discussion about Fleetwood Park and our Grade 8 program. Grade 7 parents are reminded that our next sessions are scheduled on April 23rd and April 30th. Please call the school to make an appointment. Seats are very limited.

And just like that, our week is almost completed. Busy times, much on the go, time moves very fast!

In closing, I would like to recognize and thank all students and staff for all you are doing to follow our Covid safety protocols. As we are faced with the increasing numbers of positive cases of a 3rd wave and new variants of concern, it is critical for all of us to continue to take care, stay safe and follow the public health layers of protection.
