Surrey Schools prepares for face-to-face and hybrid Summer Learning

Wednesday, June 16, 2021

With summer break fast approaching, Surrey Schools is gearing up for our <u>comprehensive summer learning program</u> for the 2021 summer session, featuring both in-person and online learning.

The delivery model for our elementary and smaller specialized programs will involve full-time face-to-face learning, while our secondary academic and remedial programs will be a combination of face-to-face and online learning. Students will receive their schedules and classroom expectations from their classroom teachers prior to the start of each program. (The delivery models are subject to change due to circumstances regarding COVID-19 or changes to provincial health guidelines which cod include full online learning if the health protocols dictate).

Registration is open until **June 28** for Surrey Schools' Summer Learning <u>full credit academic courses</u> for Grade 10-12 students, as well as <u>remedial courses</u> for Grades 8-11. Full credit courses are for students looking to get ahead or retake a

course, while remedial courses contain partial course content and are only for students who have taken the course already and want to increase their knowledge or improve their mark. Remedial courses are graded on a scale with a maximum mark of 80%.

This year's offerings include the following subjects at various grades:

- O **English:** English, Literary Studies, New Media, Creative Writing, English Studies
- O Languages: French, Mandarin, Punjabi, Spanish
- O Math: Math, Foundations of Math, Workplace Math, Calculus, Pre-Calculus
- O Physical Education: Physical Education, Active Living, Fitness & Conditioning
- O Sciences: Science, Chemistry, Physics, Life Sciences, Anatomy & Physiology
- O **Socials:** Social Studies, Exploration of Social Studies, 20th Century World

History, Human Geography, Physical Geography, Law Studies, Philosophy, Social Justice

Computer: Media Design

Not all courses are available at all sites. When registering, students will have the opportunity to associate their course with one of the following Summer School Sites:

- O Clayton Heights Secondary
- O Earl Marriott Secondary
- O Enver Creek Secondary
- O Fraser Heights Secondary
- O Guildford Park Secondary
- O Panorama Ridge Secondary
- O Princess Margaret Secondary

Students will also have hands-on learning opportunities with four programs to teach new skills: Skills in Automotive at Frank Hurt Secondary, Skills in Culinary Arts at Enver Creek Secondary, Skills in Trades at Princess Margaret Secondary and Skills in Drafting at L.A. Matheson Secondary. The goal is to expose our learners to different vocations and spark interest for further trade studies.

K-7 students may attend summer learning by staff referral for courses on Literacy & Numeracy, Early French Immersion and Late French Immersion. More information is available from your classroom teacher or school principal.

Staying safe while carpooling to and from school

C∰VID-19 Carpooling? Ride share?





Reduce the spread of COVID-19 while travelling with people outside your household

Before the trip

Always complete a COVID-19 symptom check before carpooling.

Unless you need medical care or testing, do NOT travel if you have

- □ COVID-19 symptoms
- ☐ Travelled outside of Canada within the last 14 days
- ☐ Been told to self-isolate by Public Health



- Spread out as much as possible. If there are two people, the driver should be alone in the front.
- Wear a mask over your nose and mouth.
- Travel with the same people each time.

During the trip









Open windows in the vehicle to allow air in





Set the vehicle's ventilation to bring in fresh outside air. DO NOT recirculate the air.



Avoid eating or drinking in the car.

Cleaning



Clean high contact areas (such as seat belts and door handles) every time you leave the vehicle.



If vehicles are shared on the job, clean between each shift.



Clean your hands when you get in and when you leave.

At work

If you are carpooling with another employee at your worksite, tell your employer. Your employer may use this information when making their COVID-19 Safety Plan.

STAY HOME WHEN SICK

All children and staff with common cold, influenza, COVID-19, or other respiratory diseases must stay home and self-isolate.



4. PHYSICAL DISTANCING AND MINIMIZING PHYSICAL CONTACT

Spread children out to different areas.

Take them outside more often.

Stagger lunch times. Incorporate individual activities.

Remind children, "Hands to Yourself!".



2. HAND HYGIENE

Everyone should wash their hands more often!

Thorough hand washing with plain soap and water for at least 20 seconds is the most effective way to reduce the spread of illness.



5. CLEANING AND DISINFECTION

Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at least twice a day.

General cleaning of the centre should occur at least once a day.

Use common cleaning and disinfectant products.



3. RESPIRATORY AND PERSONAL HYGIENE

Cover your coughs.

Do not touch your face.

No sharing of food, drinks, or personal items.

*Check BCCDC's Symptoms of COVID-19 regularly to ensure the list is up to date.

If you answered "YES" to one of the questions included under 'Key Symptoms of Illness' (excluding fever), you should stay home for 24 hours from when the symptom started. If the symptom improves, you may return to theschool/district site when you feel well enough. If the symptom persists or worsens, seek a health assessment.

If you answered "YES" to two or more of the questions included under 'Symptoms of Illness' or you have a fever, seek a health assessment. A health assessment includes calling 8-1-1, or a primary care provider like a physician or nurse practitioner. If a health assessment is required, you should not return to the school/district site until COVID-19 has been excluded and your symptoms have improved.

When a COVID-19 test is recommended by the health assessment:

- If the COVID-19 test is positive, you should stay home until you are told by public health to end selfisolation. In most cases this is 10 days after the onset of symptoms. Public health will contact everyone with a positive test
- If the COVID-19 test is negative, you can return to the school/district site once symptoms have improved and you feel
 well enough. Symptoms of common respiratory illnesses can persist for a week or more. Re- testing is not needed unless
 you develop a new illness.
- If a COVID-19 test is recommended but is not done because you choose not to have the test, or you donot seek a
 health assessment when recommended, and your symptoms are not related to a previously diagnosed health
 condition, you should stay home from the school/district site until 10 days after the onset of symptoms, and then you
 may return if you are feeling well enough.

If a COVID-19 test is not recommended by the health assessment, you can return to the school/district site when symptoms improve and you feel well enough. Testing may not be recommended if the assessment determines that the symptoms are due to another cause (i.e. not COVID-19).

If you answered "YES" to questions 2 or 3, use the <u>COVID-19 Self-Assessment Tool</u> to determine if you should seektesting for COVID-19.

A health-care provider note (i.e. a doctor's note) should not be required to confirm the health status of any individual.
