Health and Safety

Keeping our students and staff safe throughout this pandemic

Tuesday, October 12, 2021

We're already more than a month into the new school year, which has brought [new provincial guidelines](#), updated health and safety protocols and continued partnerships with public health to protect students and staff from COVID-19.

It's important for all of us to remain vigilant to minimize the spread of disease, and the district is following all provincial protocols and implementing extensive health and safety measures to ensure our schools are safe for students and staff.



Health Check: Everyone must continue to do a [daily health check](#) to determine if they should come into the building that day. This includes students, staff and all visitors. If anyone is experiencing any symptoms they should not come to school that day. It is critical that we all follow this guidance as health checks are our school's first and most important line of defense against COVID-19.

Masks for K-12 Students: The Surrey Board of Education and the provincial government [mandated masks for all students](#), expanding the previous mandate to now include all staff and students in kindergarten to Grade 12. Masks are an effective layer of protection against the spread of communicable disease, in tandem with other health and safety measures such as [daily health checks](#) and frequent hand washing.

Exposure Notices: Schools are a priority setting for public health and they are closely monitoring transmission in school settings and managing contacts. Right now, only those individuals who may have been exposed are contacted by public health. Families are able to access COVID-19 exposures on the [Fraser Health website](#). Fraser Health will post the school name and date(s) of exposure on their website [here](#).

Cleaning and Disinfecting: In line with provincial guidelines, high-touch surfaces such as handrails, doorknobs and tap faucets are cleaned and disinfected *at least* once per day, and surfaces touched by fewer people are cleaned once daily. The district's custodial and facilities staff continue daily cleaning and disinfecting of classrooms, hallways, libraries, gyms and [on the bus](#) at our 103 elementary schools and 21 secondary schools.



Health and Safety



Rinse / Gargle Test Kits: In partnership with public health, the district provides [take-home COVID-19 mouth rinse / gargle sample collection kits](#) to families with children who become symptomatic while at school. This initiative will help increase access to testing and work towards preventing COVID-19 transmission in the school environment.

School-Based Vaccine Clinics: The Surrey Board of Education and Fraser Health are looking into hosting vaccine clinics in schools, available to our school communities – staff, students and their families – for the purpose of increasing vaccination rates in communities where rates are low. The district is committed to keeping our learning spaces COVID-safe for our students and staff.

Traffic safety around Fleetwood Park Secondary:



Thank you to all drivers for your patience, caution and care as you navigate through the neighbouring streets and the Fleetwood Park Secondary parking lot. This year, with our increased enrollment, traffic congestion is a significant issue. We must be very vigilant of pedestrians and cyclists as they make their way to and from school and not place their safety in jeopardy.

We ask all drivers and students to consider the following:

Walk or ride your bike to school. Avoid adding to the vehicular congestion around our school.

Car pool (Please see car pool Covid safety guidelines in this newsletter).

If this is not possible, please consider the following options:

Drop-off/pick-up a couple of blocks away from the school.

Arrive at the school earlier in the mornings and a little later in the afternoons. Avoid peak traffic times.

Please do not double park behind other parked vehicles in our parking lot. This creates a hazard for pedestrians.

Please do not park in the Cycle lane on 80th Avenue. This lane should be clear for cyclists.

Please do not turn left off of 80th Avenue into our parking lots. This creates very significant delays and causes even more congestion.

Please do not enter our Staff parking lot off of 156th Street. This lot is for staff and Emergency vehicles only and is not designed for student pick up/drop off.



Lastly, a reminder to all student pedestrians. Please be very aware of your surroundings. Use side-walks and crosswalks. Do not block traffic in the roadway. This is especially important at the 80th and 156th Street intersection. Our streets are very busy; please be very cautious.

WHAT HAPPENS IF A STUDENT GETS SICK?

Extra health and safety measures, like handwashing, learning groups, masks, daily health screens, and increased cleaning, will reduce the spread of COVID-19 and help keep schools safe.

IF A STUDENT SHOWS ANY COVID-19 SYMPTOMS AT SCHOOL..

-  The child waits in an isolated room
-  The school contacts parents or guardians to take the child home
-  Staff clean and disinfect exposure areas
-  The school notifies public health officials


THEN PUBLIC HEALTH..

-  Contact traces to identify potential COVID-19 exposures
-  May recommend testing
-  May recommend 14-day isolation if necessary
-  Gets in touch with close contacts
-  Provides follow-up recommendations as needed, which may include suspending in-class learning

Parents will be notified if their child has been in contact with a COVID-positive person and needs to self-isolate. Students will receive learning support while self-isolating.

KEY SYMPTOMS OF ILLNESS	WHAT TO DO
Fever (above 38°C)	If yes to 1 or more of these symptoms: Stay home and get a health assessment.
Chills	
Cough	
Difficulty breathing	Contact a health care provider or 8-1-1 about your symptoms and next steps.
Loss of sense of smell or taste	
OTHER SYMPTOMS	WHAT TO DO
Sore throat	If yes to 1 symptom: Stay home until you feel better.
Loss of appetite	
Headache	
Body aches	If yes to 2 or more of these symptoms: Stay home for 24 hours.
Extreme fatigue or tiredness	
Nausea and vomiting	If symptoms don't get better or get worse, get a health assessment; contact a health care provider or 8-1-1 about your symptoms and next steps.
Diarrhea	
INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL:	WHAT TO DO
Have you returned from travel outside Canada in the last 14 days?	<p>If yes: All students and staff who have travelled outside of Canada are required to follow both provincial and federal requirements for entry.</p> <p>This includes students who are attending school from abroad. Students from outside of Canada should verify their entry status at least two weeks before they are scheduled to attend school. Additional information is available here.</p>
CLOSE CONTACT	WHAT TO DO
Have you been contacted by public health and notified that you are a close contact of a person confirmed to have COVID-19?	<p>If yes: Please follow the instructions provided by Public Health.</p> <p>You can call 8-1-1 anytime to get advice about how you are feeling and what to do next. Pay attention to how you are feeling. If it becomes hard to breathe, you can't drink anything or feel much worse, seek urgent medical care at an urgent care clinic or emergency department.</p>

Check your symptoms with the [K-12 Health Check](#). If you have any questions, or the symptoms get worse, contact your healthcare provider, or call 8-1-1. For more information on COVID-19, please go to www.bccdc.ca.

Note: If you develop severe symptoms, such as difficulty breathing (e.g. struggling to breathe or speaking in single words), having a very hard time waking up, confusion, or severe chest pain, call 9-1-1 or go to the nearest Emergency Department.

If you develop symptoms such as mild to moderate shortness of breath, inability to lie down because of difficulty breathing, or have chronic health conditions that you are having difficulty managing because of difficulty breathing, please consult your family doctor or nurse practitioner. You can call 8-1-1 anytime to talk to a nurse at HealthLinkBC and get advice about how you are feeling.

Reduce the spread of COVID-19 while travelling with people outside your household

Before the trip

Always complete a COVID-19 symptom check before carpooling.

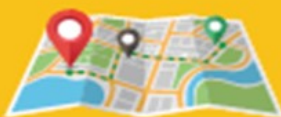
Unless you need medical care or testing, do NOT travel if you have:

- ☐ COVID-19 symptoms
- ☐ Travelled outside of Canada within the last 14 days
- ☐ Been told to self-isolate by Public Health



- Spread out as much as possible. If there are two people, the driver should be alone in the front.
- Wear a mask over your nose and mouth.
- Travel with the same people each time.

During the trip



Keep your trips as short as possible.



Open windows in the vehicle to allow air in.



Set the vehicle's ventilation to bring in fresh outside air.
DO NOT recirculate the air.



Avoid eating or drinking in the car.

Cleaning



Clean high contact areas (such as seat belts and door handles) every time you leave the vehicle.



If vehicles are shared on the job, clean between each shift.



Clean your hands when you get in and when you leave.

At work

If you are carpooling with another employee at your worksite, tell your employer. Your employer may use this information when making their COVID-19 Safety Plan.

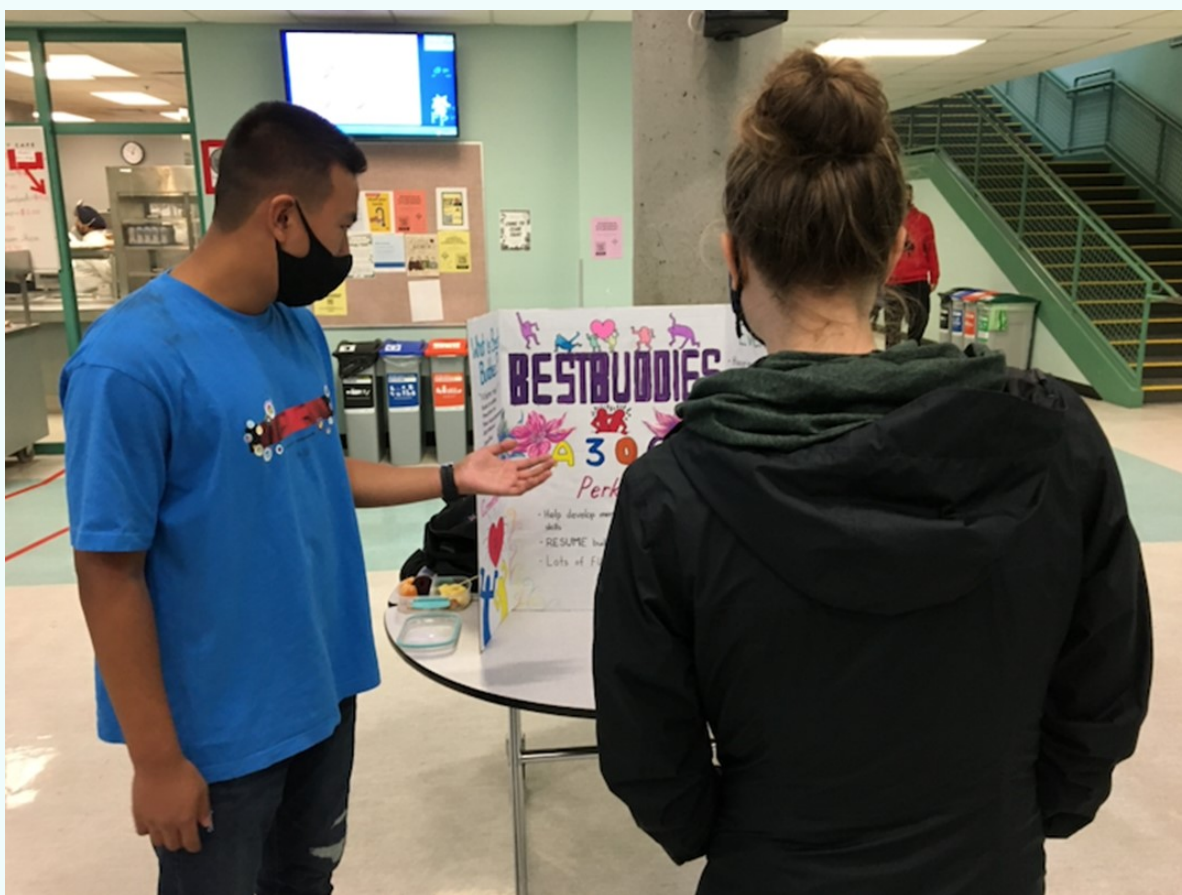


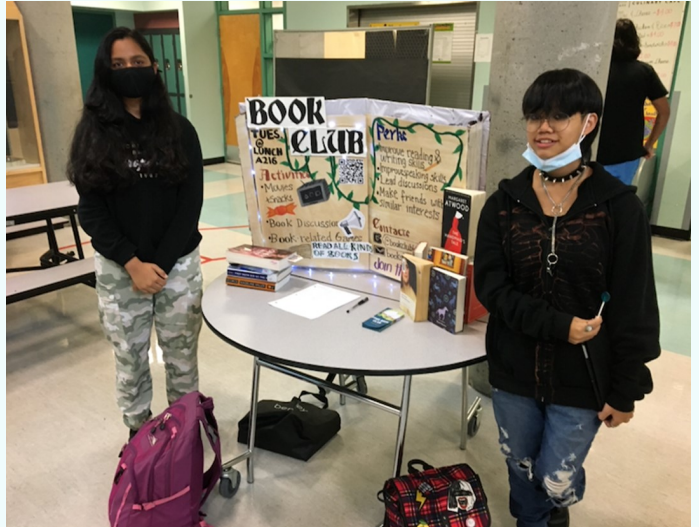
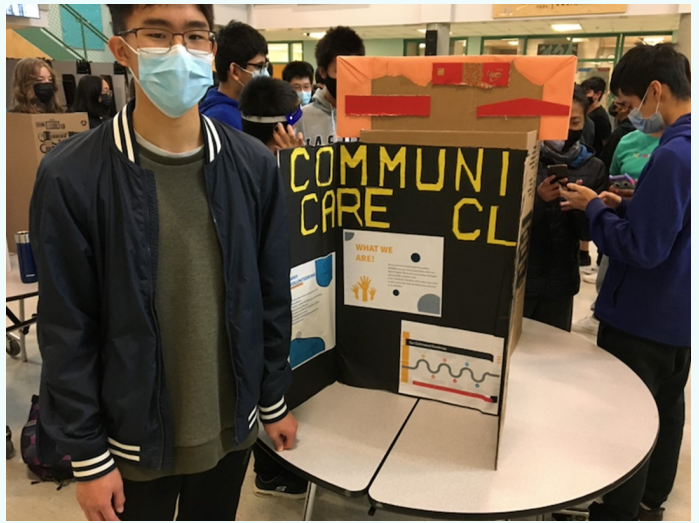
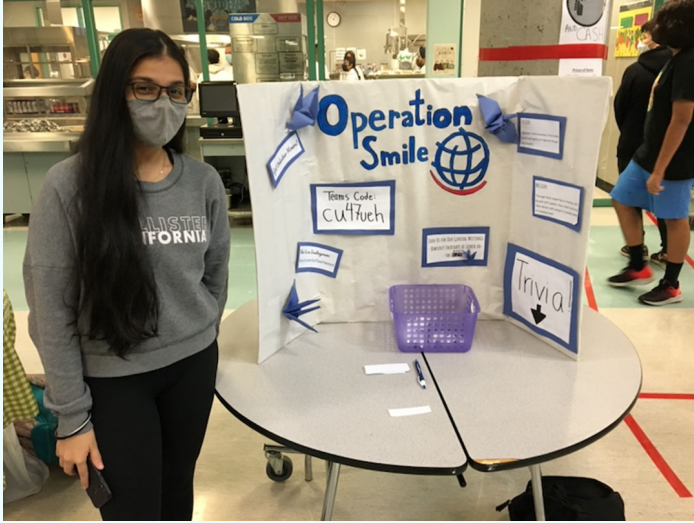
"This Week at Fleetwood Park" – Principal's Message: October 11th – 15th

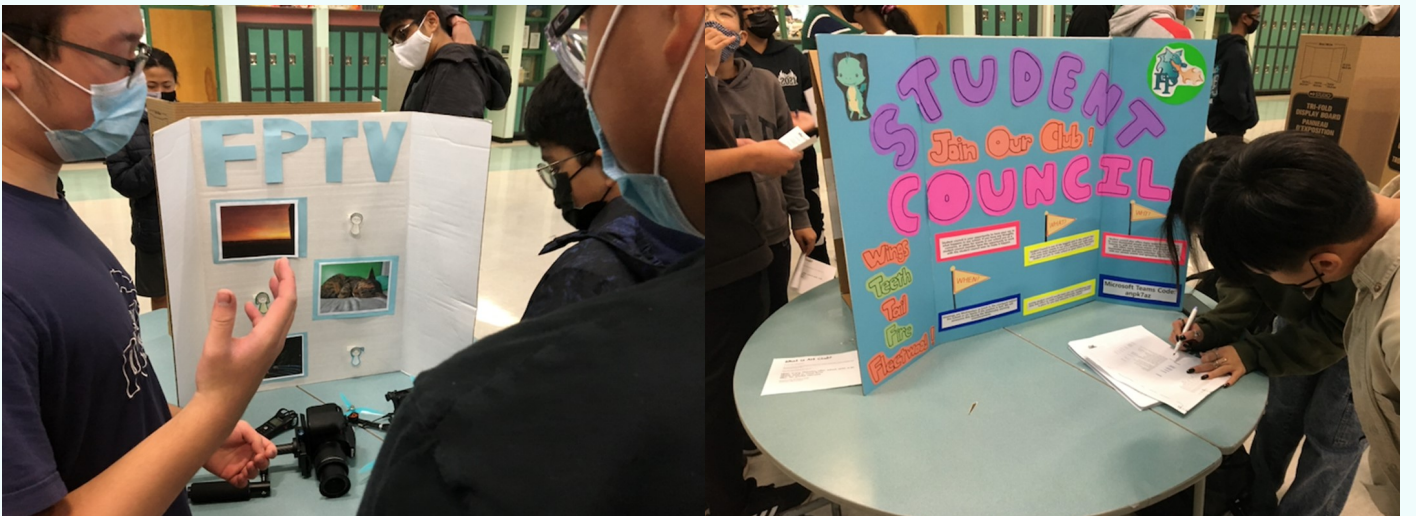
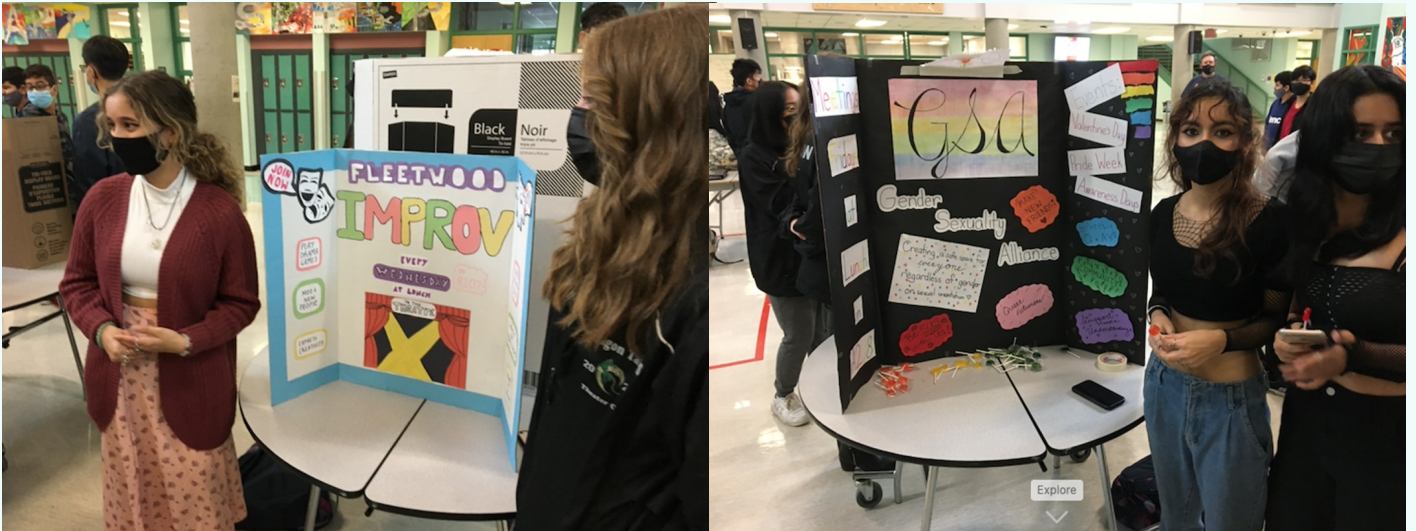
Good morning Dragons!

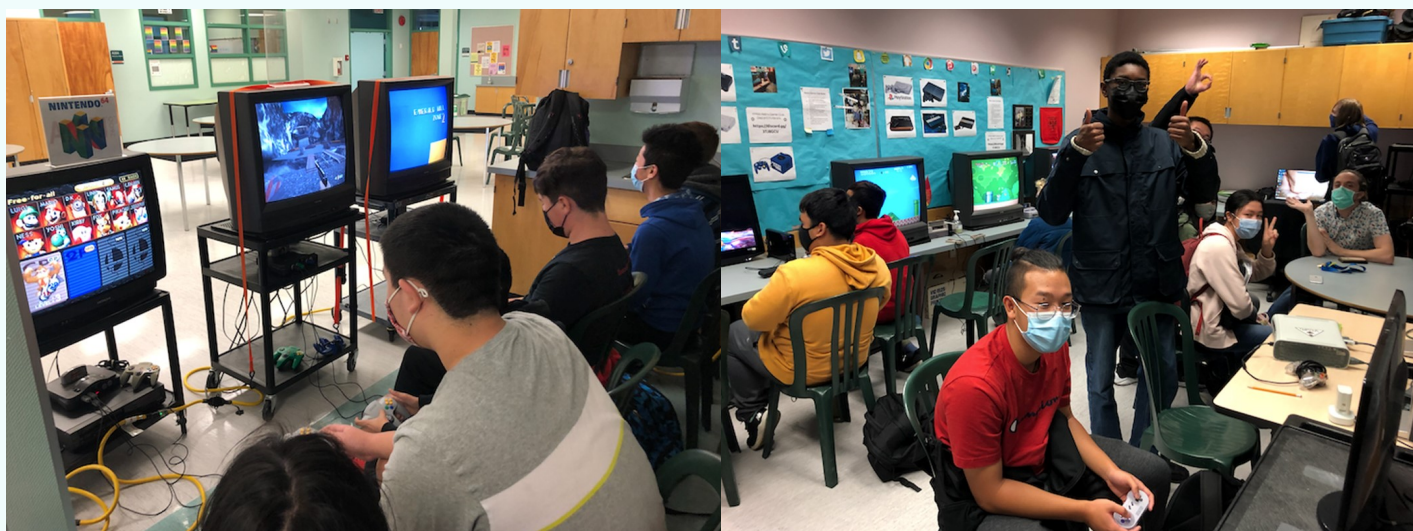
